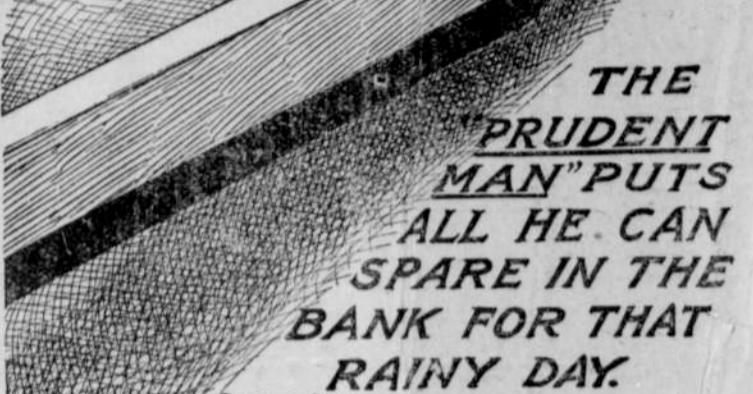

Van Winkle is to hold a mass meeting of the church people when they arrive and then attend the basketball game in a body. Lunch will be taken and a pleasant time is anticipated.

A meeting of the Parent-Teachers' Association was held last Friday evening in the auditorium of the high school and an interesting program was enjoyed. The audience was small, as the weather hindered attendance. Miss Goyno demonstrated rapid work in arithmetic by putting members of the fourth grade at the board and having them add up large lists of figures. The young pupils kept the older people working to keep up with them. Miss McKown directed a chorus of the fifth grade in a number of very pretty songs. On account of the small attendance the business was postponed until a later meeting.

A meeting of the members of the Tillamook Commercial Club was held on Monday evening to discuss the matter of disposing of the club's furniture, as it is proposed to form a Chamber of Commerce with headquarters at the city hall. Several suggestions were made, one being the appointment of a committee to interview the business men to raise sufficient money to pay off certain indebtedness. Those present, about 16, promised to contribute \$5 each. It was decided to adjourn the meeting and meet at the Court House next Monday evening, with the idea of getting together as to what is best to be done, when it is hoped that most of the business men will attend and give their advice.

On account of the splendid showing made by Tillamook county in the National Dalia show held in Portland last fall, when it captured the first prize for the best exhibit out side of Portland, a beautiful silver cup, Gil Brothers, Portland florists have made a splendid offer to the Tillamook high school. The Portland company has offered to send 200 rare varieties of dahlias in bulb form at planting time this spring to the school, provided they will be cared for and cultivated in the best possible manner. The school readily accepted the offer and a large lahla bed will be planted in the rear of the high school in the garden plot and possibly a bed of dahlias will later be planted in the front of the school buildings. The plots will be cared for by the Agriculture department under the direction of Professor Sanders.

Sheriff Crenshaw has a man in the county jail who, it is believed, is wanted at St. Maries, Idaho, on a charge of murder. He was placed in the jail as a city vagrant, and being taken out to breakfast one morning by marshal Myers, who left him in the restaurant, after he was through "beat" it out of the city. The sheriff was impressed by the description of the Idaho murderer, which exactly corresponded with the man who had been placed in the county jail. When the sheriff heard that the man had "beat it," he hurried to Garibaldi and was fortunate in confronting the man as he was hitting the ties to get out of the county. He brought him back and placed him in the jail, and sent a message to Idaho. There is a reward of \$400.00 for the arrest of the Idaho murderer.

An interesting evening service will be held at the Christian church on Sunday. The service will be conducted entirely by the young men of the congregation and promises to be something out of the ordinary. The choir will be composed of men and special numbers will be rendered such as a quartet or a number from the young men's orchestra. The sermon will be preached by Professor Crockett, teacher of the Young Men's Sunday School Class, and his subject will be "Christianity, its responsibility on the Young Christian." A large audience was out last Sunday evening to a similar service conducted, in which the only man was the Rev. Van Winkle, preaching the sermon.

DR. DANIELS BOUND OVER.

Charged with Rape and Manslaughter Performing Unlawful Operation

Dr. E. E. Daniels, a claropractor of this city is facing two serious charges which, if proven true will send him to the state penitentiary for a number of years.

The complaint charged him with rape and manslaughter, having performed a criminal operation upon a young woman.

When the case came up for preliminary hearing on Tuesday morning before Justice Stanley, District Attorney T. H. Goyno and Attorney S. S. Johnson engaged in a wordy scrap, both losing their tempers. To give them time to cool off the justice adjourned the case until the afternoon.

The prosecution called as witnesses: Ila Steininger, Arthur L. Steininger and Dr. R. T. Boals.

The defense failed to put any witnesses on the stand, and justice Stanley took the case under advisement, and on Wednesday afternoon he bound Daniels over to the grand jury on both charges and placed the bail at \$5,000.

TRAIN SERVICE REDUCED.

Mail and Passenger Service Three Days a Week.

The Southern Pacific Co. put a new schedule into effect to-day, which reduces the train service into Tillamook County to three days a week, viz. Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, with three trains a week leaving this city—Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, which will be in effect until April 1st.

This caused quite a surprise among business men, for even before the railroad made its advent into Tillamook this city had regular daily mail service. Petitions were circulated and sent to the postal authorities and the Railroad Commission asking for daily passenger and mail service.

Railroad Tied Up.

Owing to the heavy snow in the mountains, no trains have been able to get through since last Saturday. The trains which left Portland and Tillamook on Sunday had to return. The principal trouble is the falling of trees across the track. The passenger train, under the new schedule, left this city this morning and will return on Friday, bringing a week's back mail.

High School Notes.

Through the courtesy of Congressman Haawley the local high school has received some valuable government documents which materially help in study. Geographic surveys have been sent to the Agricultural department and the Congressional record is on file in the school library. This publication is very valuable in debate work as the whole question hinges on the action of Congress on the preparedness question, and it is necessary for the debaters to have the latest action of Congress on that question.

Last week the boys of the school took the opportunity to make a good sled to their own fancy for a small cost by working in the manual training department of the school. On Tuesday six were made and on Friday a total of 17 were turned out.

The final examinations in the high school are being taken up by the pupils who did not secure exemption by grades of 90 percent. The exams began on Wednesday morning and finished on Thursday afternoon. Regular classes will begin on next Monday morning.

Supt. Onthank announces that a beginning first grade class will be organized on Monday, January 24th. All parents must enter their children on that date. Children who are 6 years old at this date and also those soon to be six may enter.

Tuesday morning the students of the high school organized themselves into an Associated Student Body of Tillamook high school by adopting a constitution and a set of by-laws. The constitution had been drawn up by a committee of students and faculty and were ratified with a few changes. Speeches for and against the several articles were made by students and faculty and a vote showed that the students are satisfied with the constitution as obtained. An election of officers will take place in the near future to secure students who will carry out the provisions of the constitution and by-laws as adopted.
