A debate was held on Wednesday afternoon at the high school between affirmative and negative teams of the school and although the decision was unanimous in favor of the affirmative the three decisions were very close, Leo Doty and Ernest Crockatt represented the affirmative and Delmer Powers and Clifton Martin, the negative. The judges were Rev. Van Winkle, Rev. Yoel and Attorney Clausen. The same question was debated as has been in the high schools of the state. Resolved that the United States should adopt the essential features of the Swiss system of military training and service.

The three masted sailing schooner Repeat, which was abandoned early this week and which has been drifting off the coast was taken in tow by a tug back to the Columbia river this (Thursday) morning. According to Captain Farley of the Life Saving Station, the ship was waterlogged and had her deck load of lumber washed loose; some of the lumber was washed on shore. However, the boat was ten miles out to sea when Captain Farley saw her and four men were on board, the cabin was still above water when the ship was in tow and most of the cargo can be saved. The Repeat was home bound for Honolulu.

The student body of the high school recently organized by a constitution held a nomination of officers on Tuesday. Clifton Martin and Joe Erickson were nominated for the presidency and Ray Erickson, Alfred Fletcher and Joe Erickson for vice-president. Delmer Powers was the only nominated candidate for general manager and Zylphia Switzer and Nellie Gaylord were named for secretary. The election will be held this week. The classes also elected their representatives to the student council. Seniors, Ernest Crockatt; Juniors, Lee Dody; Sophomores, August Bonquist, and Freshman; Howard Williams.

Last Friday evening about 75 young people of the city went to Garibaldi under the supervision of Rev. Van Winkle who held a church meeting there that evening and then the Tillamook High School girls and boys basketball teams met two aggregations of Garibaldi on the new gymnasium at that place and furnished an exciting entertainment for the large crowd in attendance. After a hard fought game the local school boys defeated the Garibaldi team by the score of 25 to 18. An extra period of time was required to play off the tie of 17 to 17. The local lineup was Fletcher, Conover and Powers guards Edwards and Brooks centers and Ray Erickson and Crockatt forwards.

A. E. Holden and Ethel Holden vs. A. F. Coats Lumber Co. and Coats Driving & Boom Co., is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover \$2,500.00 damages. It is alleged in the complaint that the defendants, without any authority, began digging and constructing and dug across the plaintiff's land a ditch, and hauled and dumped into Tillamook river a large quantity of dirt at a point up stream and about 500 feet from the premises of plaintiffs. After doing so, allowed it to remain there and the current of the river following in its usual way, wash the dirt to a point within plaintiffs' land, thereby completely damming up the river and causing the river to change its ancient channel through plaintiffs' land and to seek and run into two other channels, one through a ditch and the other through a channel north of the old channel, and through the premises, thus changing the channel and washing away and inundating the soil, and destroying the land. By reason of these alleged damages plaintiffs seek to recover \$2,500.00.

**A New Organization Formed.**

Last Friday evening about fifty influential men of the community attended a supper provided for them at the Presbyterian Guild Hall and served by the Ladies Guild. At the conclusion of the elegant supper the object of the event was stated, and Carl Haberlach was made temporary chairman and A. H. Gaylord temporary secretary. The committee formerly authorized to draft a constitution submitted its report, which, after some discussions was adopted, and named "The Men's Club of Tillamook." Its object as stated in the constitution is as follows: "To serve as a strong arm of the church in the promotion of physical, intellectual, and spiritual development, fraternal and social relations, the fostering of a home-like sense of confidence and repose, and the engagement in works of christian extension, human uplift, and setting standards for youth. The expression of these aims and interests may be just as expansive and varied as the inclinations of the men composing the membership require, in faithful keeping with the good name and mission of the church and honorable manhood." Over thirty charter members launched the organization. Officers elected are as follows: President, Roy C. Jones; vice-president, E. J. Clausen; Secretary-Treasurer, Emmett M. Bales. Meetings are to be held at the Guild Hall fortnightly. Standing committees will be appointed at the next meeting which will be held in the evening of Feb. 14.
