It is about time that the people of Tillamook County, should register a mighty kick, until we get our mail service restored, as good, at least, as Edmunds, merchant, Tilla- it was before the railroad was built Thirty five years ago, we had better mail service than we have today when the wagon road extended only about six miles south of Tillamook City, from there to Beaver and south, was nothing but a trail and a mighty rough one at that. Bud and Jeff Wallace carried the mail from Grande Ronde to Tillamook and I carried from the same point to Oretown. There were no roads worth the name, and no bridges over the streams. We simply had to go through hell and high water, but we landed the mail and were seldom half a day late. Now there are pretty good roads and bridges, and the only pass into Tillamook County, that is open summer and winter. The mail route from Grande Ronde to Oretown and Cloverdale should be re-established immediately and once more we can have regular mail service, summer and winter, and no part of the county need suffer.

The Southern Pacific Company not to blame for the road blockade. It is their misfortune and not our fault, that the road was built in the wrong place. It will never be practical for anything but a logging road and will always be expensive to maintain in the winter. They can grade a road from Willamina to Tillamook for less money than the upkeep of the present road will cost, for the next ten years, and pass through a good farming and dairy country all the way; and as safe in winter as in summer Any way we want our mail service
