A Rural Credit System for Oregon.

Cheap money for the Oregon farmer and the best method of obtaining it is engaging state wide attention and a conference has been called to meet in Salem during March to consider this and other kindred subjects.

I believe that it will be generally conceded that the farmer is entitled to borrow money at less than eight per cent. This being so, how may we best obtain this result? The state is now loaning the six million dollar school fund to Oregon farmers at six per cent, however, this fund is totally inadequate to meet the demands upon it and there is always a long waiting list. This fund is being successfully administered for sixteenths of one per cent and is a boon to the few farmers who are fortunate enough to secure loans from it. Why not use this as a basis for a system of rural credits, and increase the fund through the issuance and sale of state bonds? The loaning of the state school fund is a success and the extension of a successfully operating plan is more to be desired, than the adoption of a new and untried plan. State bonds could doubtless be disposed of at four or four and one half per cent. This would leave a margin of one and one half or two percent to cover administration and to insure the state against loss, and would doubtless yield a profit that could be applied to the state school fund. This plan will require the adoption of a constitutional amendment, and such amendment should be broad enough to permit of the bonds being deposited with the U. S. Treasurer as the basis for the issuance of Federal currency to the state as it is now issued to National Banks. This co-operative plan of rural credits has the endorsement of the Grange and its only objection is common to all systems of national credits, in that we must wait the slow grinding of Federal legislative action before receiving any benefits. Now is the crucial time in the development of agricultural and other resources. We need capital, both state and private, to carry on this development and we need more restrictions around the expenditure of state funds and less restriction around the expenditure of private funds.

Oregon has a credit worth millions of dollars and it may well be used in discretion for the benefit of the Oregon farmer and the upbuilding of the state in such a manner that it will not cost the taxpayer a cent and will actually produce a revenue.

Grange Position.

National loans to farmers and limit placed upon interest to be charged by private capital for farm loans are the demands made by the Grange, as per the following resolutions reaffirmed at its recent national convention at Oakland:

Resolved, That any farm credit plan which does not include a direct reduction of the "prevailing rates" of interest, as well as a long term of small annual payment, upon farm mortgages will not meet agricultural requirements or materially benefit our farmers.

Resolved, That no farm credit law which places in the hands of private capital the power to make interest rates on mortgage bonds, without limitation by Federal law, will meet either the needs of agriculture or the just demands of the National Grange.

Resolved, That the Government of the United States shall lend money at a rate not to exceed 4 1/2 per cent to farmers, upon thirty year farm land mortgages, with such provisions as may be necessary to make the Government perfectly safe, with the addition of an amortization charge that will pay the principal in that time, provided, that not more than \$10,000 shall be loaned to any one person and that no person owning more than \$20,000 worth of land shall be entitled to these privileges.

Resolved, That the legislative committee and officers of the Grange throughout the country are instructed to insist, on behalf of this body, that more substantial government aid, to steady interest and uphold the market for farm mortgage bonds, shall be included in the bill finally passed by Congress.
