## County Officials Consider New Road Site at Bar View.

This week County Judge Hare and County Surveyor Shreve have been down at Barview looking over the prospects for a new right of way for the county road which was taken away by the high tides and storms of the last months, when the whole beach was gulped down by the waves. It will be necessary to come to some agreement with the railroad authorities on a right of way or else build the road on the hillside where the surveyor has already run a preliminary line. The land that will be cut by the road is very valuable and there will be a large expense to secure a good line for the road. The county judge will go out to Portland to arrange directly with the railroad authorities if possible for a right of way on the level stretch at the foot of the hill.
