RECALL PETITIONS CIRCULATED.

People of Nehalem Disagree Over Road Matters and Want McKimins Recalled.

What is probably a factional fight at Nehalem is the cause of petitions being circulated for the recall of County Commissioner G. R. McKimins, growing out of a difference of opinion as to where the road money should be expended in road district No. 1. A large number of persons living in that district have signed the petitions, but in other parts of the county there is little or no interest taken in the recall of Mr. McKimins, in fact, there are a good many persons who object to putting the county to the expense of a recall election. J. W. Thompson is named in the petition as a candidate for the office. He is a Socialist and at the last general election opposed the Republican candidate and worked for the election of Mr. McKimins. Now he is wanting Mr. McKimins ousted and himself elected to the office of County Commissioner.

The petition reads: To J. C. Holden, County Clerk of Tillamook County, State of Oregon:

We the undersigned, legal voters of and within Tillamook County, State of Oregon, hereby demand the recall of George R. McKimins, County Commissioner of Tillamook County from the North District.

The reasons for said demand are as follows, to-wit:

He has proven himself to the satisfaction of the people of the North District to be incompetent to conduct the affairs of the office of County Commissioner.

He has failed to spend the money appropriated for the various road districts in a judicious manner and conducted the road work in an incompetent manner.

He has arbitrarily announced that he would not make certain road improvements if the money was appropriated at the Tax Payers' Meeting when such road is the most heavily traveled in the North District and greatly in need of repair.

And we further respectfully request that, upon filing of this petition, you order a special election to be held for the purpose of said recall, in the manner provided by law and that the name of James W. Thompson be placed upon the ballot of such recall election as the choice of the undersigned for the office of County Commissioner of Tillamook County from the First District.

High School Arranging Farmer's Short Course.

A Farmer's Short Course for the two weeks from Monday, Feb. 21 to Friday, March 3rd, is being arranged by the high school and County Agriculturist Jones. Letters are being sent out to farmers in the neighborhood of Tillamook, announcing the subjects which will be discussed during the course. The discussions will be led for the most part by County Agriculturist Jones and G. F. Sanders who has charge of the agricultural work in the high school, but a number of local farmers have consented to lead on subjects in which they are interested and all discussions will be open to anyone present. The aim being to provoke an exchange and interchange of ideas and experience, as much as to provide lectures and instruction. A. F. Keyes will give the result of the farm management survey which is being made in the county. Two will probably be devoted to instruction in milk testing and the general knowledge required for cheese makers under the present law. Other subjects which will be discussed are: Orchard Pruning and Spraying; Feeds and Feeding; Potato and Potato Blight; Drainage; Crop Rotation and Breeds and Breeding and Bee Culture.

The meeting will be held in Tillamook high school building from 1:00 to 2:00 each afternoon. Everyone interested is invited to attend.
