**Editorial Snap Shots.**

If the movies pourtray scenes of real life, there must be some kissing going on in the world.

If the recall election is persisted in it will end in a farce, and the horse laugh will be on the Nehalem people.

The daily train and mail service on the railroad, which was resumed this week, was welcomed by the people of the county.

The editors of Washington County is forming a local organization. That is a good move, and we wish them success, for it will be a financial benefit to every publisher in that county.

Bro. Trombley don't like his own medicine. He was one of those who fell all over himself in advocating for the Oregon System. Now that a recall election is proposed, he is opposed to it, notwithstanding that those that signed the recall petitions were perfectly within their rights of invoking the recall election.

With the exception of making a few dollars when a fellow has nothing to do, under our new fangled system the taxpayers can be made to foot the bills for a recall election. The next state legislature should pass a law to saddle the expense of a recall election upon those who started it.

In theory there is no difference between rook, whist, 500 and other games, but it costs 50c. for a pack of rook cards and 10c. for a pack of the other kind, so we suppose the person who thinks it a sin to play with the 10c. kind, pays the extra 40c. to cover up what is considered sinful. Strange, isn't it, that some people object to cards because some people gamble with them. If that was good logic, they would also object to handling money because the gamblers play for money. But, how horrible! The gamblers are now using rook cards.

It seems to be definitely decided to have a recall election, thereby forcing road districts Nos. 2 and 3 to take part in an election in which the people are not interested. That point being settled we are now in good humor to get into the scrap, and advise that it be made a political fight. J. W. Thompson is a Socialist, who is mentioned in the recall petition; Geo. R. McKimins is a Democrat; give all parties a square deal a Republican should be run to balance the parties. A good strong Republican, in our judgment, would, under the circumstances, be supported by the people of the county.

We wonder how Bro. Trombley the Democratic free trade rooster, is going to explain the reason of the average price of cheese falling to 13.79 cents last year? In 1913 it was 15.45 cents and in 1914 it was 15.38 cents. When the dairymen of Tillamook County go to the polls next November it won't be to vote for free trade Democrats, for their milk checks the past year have thoroughly convinced them that there is something radically wrong with the Democratic administration. There may be a few instances where the Democratic party succeeded in reducing the cost of living, and this appears to be one of them, and at the expense of the dairymen of this county.

For the information of Republican candidates the snap shot man will strictly adhere to the policy he has always followed in the primary elections by giving every candidate a fair deal and not allow one disrespectful word to be published about them. When the Republicans of the County have made their choice of candidates, then the snap shot man will endeavor to elect the Republican ticket from top to bottom. We are well aware that if the influence of the Headlight was used in behalf of any one candidate, it would be unfair to other candidates, but we would be strictly within our rights as a newspaper if we cared to advise the people to vote as we indicated. But we do not intend doing so, for the Headlight has stood by the choice of the Republican voters in past elections and will do so in the future.

The snap shot man is desirous that some amicable understanding can be reached to avoid a recall election, which we are not in sympathy with, and opposed to. We are going to make a suggestion to those who want the recall election, with the object of appealing to their intelligence and justice. If Commissioner McKimins has erred in judgment, as the petition claim, then why not appeal to the County Court, for County Judge Here and Commissioner Owens have as much interest in the improvement of roads at Nehalem as in other parts of the county and they should be appealed to before the recall petitions are filed. Our suggestion is that the County Court should advise the voters in the situation at Nehalem with the object of revising where the

money in that district should be expended and for the best interests of the people living there. The snap shot man believes that if our suggestion is followed an amicable agreement can be arrived at, for, after all, there is not sufficient grounds to justify a recall election, for it will be found, when the facts are known about some of the charges brought against Mr. McKimins, they cannot be substantiated. It would not be a bad idea to have several disinterested citizens accompany the court to act in an advisory capacity. The snap shot man is anxious to see the road work in the county started as soon as possible, and the money that is to be expended in road district No. 1 this year should be expended to the best advantage. Our advice to the people is to get together in a give and take spirit, and if they will do that the matters in dispute can be settled amicably.

**Timidity and Conscription.**

Evidently the timidity shown by the British advocates of conscription was the chief contributing cause of the weakness of that cause in Great Britain. When the measure of compulsory military service on a modified scale was boldly pushed for passage in Parliament the opposition soon dwindled to insignificant proportions. It is absurd that the country in the plight of Great Britain at the present time should hesitate to compel every citizen to do his part for the common defense. Neither democracy nor good common sense can be rallied to the support of the opponents of conscription in such circumstances.

**Segregation of Vice.**

Billy Sunday is advocating segregated vice districts. That won't do. If he goes into that business his evangelism will soon tumble. Oh, yes; a person may make a strong argument for it, but arguments for wrong, it makes no difference how overwhelming they are, don't prove anything. There are many arguments in the world that you are ready to slap in the face as soon as they turn up, and this is one of them. Legalized prostitution has its strong supporters, but one doesn't care to argue it to his sons and daughters or to uphold it at their dinner table. The idea is not near as strong as it used to be and in a few years it will disappear altogether in spite of Billy's advocacy. If vice reigns, let it not be in the smiles, but in the shadows of society.

**How We Finance Canada.**

It is interesting to learn from the leading financial organ of Canada that Our Lady of the Snows no longer looks to London, but to this country, as her banking center. This, of course, is due to the war, but it seems doubtful if there will ever be a reversion to the older order. So far we have purchased over \$200,000,000 worth of securities from Canada. It is not only Dominion and state bonds which have been disposed of, but the Canadians have been selling other securities which they held to raise money. Moreover, a large amount of Canadian securities heretofore held in London has been marketed here. The steady drain from London of securities of all kinds continues, and all are absorbed promptly. Never before in the history of America has this country been able to buy so much, and there is no lack of the supply in money.

**Paderewski's Plea for Poland.**

After having striven hard to secure relief for his suffering fellow-country men, Poland's greatest pianist expresses disappointment that the general American public has not responded to his prayer. He explains the partial differences, however, when he says that Belgium aroused America's sympathy because it was the war's first great horror, and thus Poland's tragedy came too late. To some degree the public mind has become accustomed to tales of suffering. Nevertheless, as Paderewski says, the blight of war has fallen more heavily upon Poland than upon any other land. The suffering of Belgium was great, but that in Poland is infinitely greater. The situation is one that out to appeal to the generosity of Americans. This is no time to close the heart to a cry for relief because of having responded to earlier appeals.

**It Only Needs assured Protection**

The majority party in Congress will make a grievous mistake if it permits its aversion to the protective tariff principle to check the development of the dyestuff industry in this country. It took the war to bring forcibly home to us our dependence on Germany for dyes, and the crippling of many of our industries as a result of the present shortage shows the necessity of taking steps to guarantee a supply of home-made colors.

The idea that the secret of dye-making is one of Germany's exclusive possessions has been exploded. German enterprise developed as British invention until the Kaiser's empire controlled the world's markets. Yankee ingenuity has discovered the way to make this country independent of any other nation for its dyes, and Yankee enterprise is ready to break Germany's monopoly of the world supply provided it gets some encouragement. The only encouragement it needs is the assurance that once American capital invests in dye manufacturing on a large scale the industry will not be laid open to annihilation through the trade war Germany would be in a position successfully to wage after the close of hostilities.

This assurance can be best furnished by a system of protective duties such as is proposed in the Hill bill now before congress. A reasonable tariff for a reasonable time would meet all requirements. Under such a tariff an industry could be built up in a few years that would put us in a position to hold our own against the rest of the world. This country is

dealing with a genuinely infant industry—not with a finely established one.

**Letter on the Recall Giving Reasons for Doing so.**

To the Editor of the Headlight:—  
I regret very much that you should have been misinformed as to the reason of the recall of County Commissioner G. R. McKimins as is indicated in your last issue. The Nehalem Valley residents, who are backing the recall, want the voters of the county to fully understand that this is not a factional fight, but, on the other hand, it is the first time in the history of the valley that they have been united. They are not dissatisfied as to where the money has been spent, but because it has not been spent when appropriated.

The three reasons given for the recall are not the only ones the people have, as will be seen before this campaign is over. The reasons are:  
"He has proven himself to be incompetent to conduct the affairs of the office of County Commissioner."  
Last summer, when the roads needed repair and the residents of the valley needed work, the road work was suddenly stopped because "there is no more money" and, at that very time, there was \$10,000 of the money appropriated for road district No. 1 in the county treasury which was not and never has been spent in this district.

He moved the rock crusher on the North Fork from a big ledge of rock, at a big expense, to a small ledge which is more expensive to operate and only operated it two days.

He bought and located a rock crusher below Brighton on the railroad and more than three miles from any county road at an expense we cannot state now and it has proven of no benefit to Road District No. 1.

These are a part of the proofs for reason No. 1.

"He has failed to spend the money appropriated for the various road districts in a judicious manner and conducted the road work in an incompetent manner."  
The roads of the entire Nehalem Valley and, in fact, the entire North district testify to this; even the money spent on his own road.

The Foley Creek bridge has been out nearly two months, when it could have been replaced within two weeks. The East Foley creek bridge has been out the same time and could have been replaced in two days at the most.

"He has arbitrarily announced that he would not make certain road improvements if the money was appropriated at the Tax Payers' Meeting when such road is the most heavily traveled in the North District and greatly needs repair."  
Those attending the Tax Payers' Meeting know of his attitude when an appropriation of \$2,000 was asked for the Nehalem-Beach road, traveled by thousands each year, and the people of the North District know how badly that road needs repair.

The experience of the European belligerents point the wisdom of Gen. Hugh Scott's advice that some form of censorship be devised as part of our preparedness program. Only in the case of this country, the device should be a bureau of censors. We do not need to go abroad for evidence of the need of such an arrangement. Within the past few weeks the muzzling of Rear Admiral Fiske, whose expert knowledge of naval affairs furnishes an example of the way information might be withheld in case of war.
