February Weather Proves Unique.

The official weather report for February shows just 17 rainy days and in that time a total of 18.57 inches of rain was precipitated. The greatest fall for one day was 4.27 inches. During the month there were some days that were delightfully pleasant and warm. On the 25th the thermometer reached the high mark of 70 degrees and on the morning of the 26th it fell again to 26 degrees. During the latter part of the month strong easterly winds would blow in the morning and change to north-west by 10 a.m.

Grand Jury's Report.

We, the Grand Jury selected at the regular February term of the above named court for the year 1916, do hereby most emphatically report that we have finished our labors as such grand jury and ask that we be discharged from further labors hereon. We have examined what prisons were accessible to us in Tillamook City, as well as the various county offices and the records thereof, and we desire to report that we find the said offices and records in good condition, and hereby commend the officers of the county for their faithful performance of their duties in general and in the keeping of such records particularly.

As to the condition of the court house, we do hereby most respectfully submit that the County Clerk's office and the Sheriff's office are very much in need of more room and there is danger that the said records may be destroyed in case of fire, and would most urgently recommend to the County Court of this county that they provide more room for such offices in particular, and to that end would suggest that a vault be built for the said Sheriff's and Clerk's offices of sufficient size to properly contain the said records, and in order to make more room in such court house, would suggest that the jail be removed from the first floor to the basement and that the attic be fitted up for office rooms, and believe that if such improvement be made that the court house will be sufficiently large to accommodate the business of the county for several years to come.

We find that the said court house is not connected with the city sewer, and that the same is somewhat of a menace to public health, and would also, therefore, further recommend that the said court house be connected with the city sewer of Tillamook.

Probable Chatauqua Dates Set.

In answer to a wire received by C. J. Edwards, from the Ellison-White Lyceum company, inquiring as to the desirable date for the local chatauqua and giving two dates for selection, Professor Onthank wrote on Wednesday, asking for July 19 to 24, if it was not possible to secure a later date. The other date mentioned in the wire was July 5 to 10, but after consulting with many people it was decided that the haying season would materially interfere with the course on that date. It was thought that by the end of July that the weather would be good and that haying would be over, giving prospects of a large attendance, also the beach visitors would be more likely to attend on a later date.

Over 60 people are now backing the local chatauqua, this list including all of last year's list and about 15 more. The numbers that will probably be scheduled for this circuit are, according to Professor Onthank of a much better grade than last year.
