A car load of Overland autos reached this city and were sold immediately and another car load ordered. Christensen and Haberlach are now handling those autos in this county.

The County Court accepted the bid of A. A. Arstall for the W. S. Cone road, the lowest bid being \$2,034. As there was only one bid for crushed rock and the Squires road these bids were rejected.

Sheriff Crenshaw and his deputies are in the midst of tax collecting, and one feature of this year's taxes is that a larger proportion of taxpayers are only paying half their taxes. It is new less than a month for taxes to be paid.

Chas. F. Pankow vs. Harry Willson. Rollie W. Watson and Ray B. Walls is a suit filed in the circuit court, being a labor lien for certain work performed for Harry Willson, amounting to the sum of \$55.25, the two latter defendants being sureties.

Next Saturday evening at the Star Theatre there will be a great attraction for those who patronize this popular place of amusement, which is giving fine attractions right along. Saturday will be a feature play, entitled "Mr. Grex of Monte Carlo," from the novel by E. Phillips Oppenheim.

Reed, of Neah-kah-nie, was in the city on Saturday interviewing a number of business men and citizens, in regard to the county commissioner's ship for the North part of the county, and being assured of their support, the will become a candidate at the primary election. When interrogated as to the different bridge proposals in the north end of the county, Mr. Reed appears to have made it clear that this is a matter for engineers to decide, not this faction or that faction of this town or that town. When the time was ripe to make these improvements, which was not at present he was willing to leave that to the discretion of the State Highway Engineers.

Attorneys in Law Suit.

Oak Nolan vs. C. W. Talmage, administrator of the estate of C. B. Hadley, deceased, is a suit filed in the circuit court, in which the plaintiff demands judgment against the defendant for \$25,000. The complaint alleges that C. B. Hadley died intestate during the month of December, 1911, that C. W. Talmage was appointed administrator, and that no final account has ever been filed. That on the 24th of February, 1912, defendant and Otelia Hadley, acting for and on behalf of the estate, contracted and procured the services of plaintiff to institute certain matters of litigation and prosecute the same to a final termination. Plaintiff claims that he fully performed and defended each of said matters, which extended over four years, and involved the preparation of a most complicated and voluminous record, as well as the arguments for and against a large number of motions and long and vexatious trials, and many appeals. That the reasonable value of said services is and was the sum of \$25,000, and each of said parties promised and agreed to pay plaintiff that amount of money out of the estate of C. B. Hadley. That no part of this amount has been paid, and plaintiff's claim was refused and rejected, therefore he asks the court for a judgment of \$25,000.
