W. S. Cone, of Bay City, and Chas. Ray and L. M. Kraner, of Cloverdale, were in the city on Saturday talking up the proposition to bond the county for \$420,000 for hardsurfacing the main highway through the county.

At a meeting of the Fair Board on Saturday, it was decided to ask the people to recommend a person to fill the vacancy on the board on account of the death of J. H. Dunstan, who represented the north of the county on the board. Several names have been mentioned for the position, who reside in the central part of the county, and whether they would be agreeable to the north end of the county should no one there aspire to the position, remains to be seen.

C. W. Talmage, administrator of the estate of C. E. Hadley, made answer in the case in which Oak Nolan sued for \$25,000 for professional services. The administrator denies that he contracted with or procured the professional services of the plaintiff to institute or defend the suits mentioned in the complaints, or to do or perform any professional services, or any services of any nature whatsoever, but admits that plaintiff attempted to present a pretended claim against the estate.

The Tillamook Headlight in a strong editorial last week declares that it is Tillamook County's turn to have a senator and that county will put up a strong fight for the office.—Banks Herald.

Circuit Judge Gatens has appointed H. A. Andrews, H. A. Ruble and A. C. Schow on the joint committee of Bayocean Park the affairs of which are now in litigation in the circuit and Federal courts. The three will represent the complainant property owners. They succeeded on the committee H. D. Ramsdell, B. O. Case and J. Smith. Judge Gatens also appointed Attorneys C. W. Fulton and J. F. Sedgwick to represent the property owners in the fight in the Federal district court against the foreclosure of a mortgage on the property.—Journal.

Holt is a suit filed in the circuit court, in which plaintiff prays that judgment be entered in favor of plaintiff Lottie M. Hunt in the sum of \$6,750.00; that judgment be entered in favor of Geo. Williams, trustee, for \$1,750.00; that judgment be entered in favor of the plaintiffs in the sum of \$500.00 for attorney's fees; that a decree be entered declaring the plaintiff's claims to be a first lien and mortgage upon certain real estate and personal property.

A petition is being circulated asking Governor Withcombe to pardon John Theiler, who pleaded guilty to a charge of violating the prohibition law, and is now serving out the sentence, and is compelled to work on the roads. A revenue officer came in last week, when Theiler had to dig up nearly \$80.00 to pay for a government and rectifier's license. Geo. Bean had also to pay for a government license, as he had pleaded guilty to violating the prohibition law, but has not been sentenced yet. County Judge J. B. Dodson and Commissioner W. S. Allen, of Yamhill County, came to Tillamook on Wednesday to confer with the Tillamook County Court in regard to the Sour Grass road. They went into joint session and opened bids for the four bridges that are to be constructed on that road. The bids received were:

The bid of the Tillamook Bay Construction Co. was accepted. There was another bid which came in too late from H. D. Bond for \$1,199.00.

Sues County for \$5; Costs \$9.70.

A suit was filed in the Justice court this week by R. B. Driscoll against Tillamook County, in which the plaintiff claims the sum of \$5.00 for stenographic work in taking the testimony in the preliminary hearing of the Daniels case.

The case came up on a demurrer to the complaint Wednesday, and Deputy District Attorney Callahan, who appeared for the county, contended that the complaint was insufficient to constitute a claim against the county, and that the justice court was without jurisdiction to set aside the action of the county, who had previously disallowed the claim.

The demurrer was sustained, and judgment was given the county against plaintiff for \$9.70 costs. An appeal will probably be taken to the Supreme Court.

Wheeler Mill to Remain Idle.

It is reported that the Wheeler Lumber Co.'s saw mill at Wheeler will not resume operations, those interested in that enterprise thinking it not advisable to do so, for it is feared that the revival in the lumber business will only last a short time. Another thing that the mill company is particularly interested in, and that is the result of the work on the jetties to improve Nehalem bar, which is hoped will enable large lumber vessels to enter that harbor. As soon as sufficient depth of water is obtained and vessels can be used to ship the lumber, the mill will resume operations. It will be remembered that a large amount of money was expended in the erection of this large, modern sawmill, which employed a large number of men and was the biggest lumber industry in the county, but the Democratic free trade party placed lumber on the free list, when lumber took a big slump, closing down this local industry and hundreds of sawmills in the Northwest. In fact, placing lumber on the free list did Oregon a lot of harm, and will do so as long as lumber is kept on the free list.

To Bond the County to Build Hard Surface Roads.

Petitions are being circulated in different parts of the county for signatures, that the question of bonding to build hard surface roads may be placed upon the ballot to be voted on at the coming fall election. The petition circulated in and around Cloverdale is meeting with unexpected favor. There is scarcely anyone here that does not favor bonding for hard surface roads. The petition calls for a hard surface road through the county from the north boundary line of the county to the south part of the county by way of Tillamook, Cloverdale and Little Nestucca to connect with some road leading out of the county.

A recommendation is made in the petition that the County Court appoint the following named gentlemen to act in conjunction with the County Court as an advisory board: Herman Farmer and Chas. Ray, for the south district; M. W. Harrison, F. R. Beals and Samuel Brodhead, for the middle district; Fred Zaddach and Rudolph Zweifel, for the north district.—Courier.
