It benefits a large number of settlers in that part of the county, but its roughly estimated that it will cost \$100,000 more than the Three River road when it is constructed and hard surfaced. The State Engineers are going over such route, and which route they recommend, no doubt this will eventually become part of the highway.

Sappington is a suit filed in the circuit court in which plaintiffs pray that the trust be terminated and ended, and that the defendant be enjoined from making any further sales, conveyances or disposition of any portion of Rose City Beach held by him as trustee; that defendant be required to render a statement and account of all portions of the lots sold, so that the court may determine the amount due plaintiffs, and in the event of the defendant failing to make such accounting, plaintiffs recover \$10,000 and the undivided thirteen twenty-firsts of Rose City Beach.

### City Sues Giebish & Joplin.

Tillamook City vs. A. Giebish, F. Joplin and Aetna Accident and Liability Co., is a suit filed in the circuit court. The complaint alleges that the plaintiff entered into a contract with the Warren Construction Co. for the construction of a sewer system and that the company sublet the contract, that on December 13, 1912, defendants partially completed the sewer, but had not completed the same in the following particulars, to wit: That the trenches dug for the sewer had not been entirely filled, and the street and grounds through which the sewer had been constructed had not been restored to as good condition as the same were in when the sewer construction was commenced. This work should have been completed before June 15, 1913, and the defendants gave a bond of \$2,000.00 with the Aetna Accident & Liability Co. The defendants refused and neglected to comply with the terms of the agreement and complete the work it costing the city \$94.88 to do so, which the city now seeks to recover.
