

THE RECALL PETITION.

Effort Being Made to Force the County Clerk to Call an Election.

On Monday J. W. Thompson made a demand upon County Clerk J. C. Holden to call a special election for the recall of County Commissioner Geo. R. McKimins, petitions having been filed with the County Clerk, which, however, did not contain sufficient names to justify him in doing so. The County Clerk acted on the advice of District Attorney T. H. Goynne and Attorney General Brown, the latter giving it as his opinion that the petitions should have 520 names before the County Clerk would have power to call an election. The petitions contained 364 names, 9 of whom have asked to have their names erased. Mr. Holden notified those who were instrumental in circulating the petitions for the recall election that they were not sufficient names, but they contended that the County Clerk should call the election regardless of the number of names signed on the petitions. Had Mr. Holden complied with the demand, it would have put the county to the expense of a special election, followed with litigation that would have quashed the election, which would have been a willful waste of over \$1,000 of the taxpayer's money.

Not content with the opinions of the district attorney and the attorney general, Attorney Marx has been retained, and he left on Tuesday for Salem to institute mandamus proceedings in the Supreme Court. This will decide the point as to how many names are required on a recall petition, should the Supreme Court comply with the request.

India's needs are great, if only here were more willing to take up the foreign work.' Much more was written that would be valuable to all if space would permit.

The writer, Miss Gertrude Minhorn, a missionary doctor sent by the American Luthiana Committee Interdenominational, and is a cousin of Mrs. C. J. Edwards of Tillamook.

Notice of Appointment of Viewers For Assessing Damages and Benefits in Laying out Streets.

Myers as viewers, to view the following proposed streets to-wit: An extension of Tenth Street, or the street planned in A. A. Miller's Addition as Seventh Street, from the West line of Block 46 of Thayer's Addition to Tillamook City as provided for by Ordinance No. 298 of Tillamook City, approved August 3, 1915, and has appointed Tuesday the 25th day of April, 1916, at the City Hall, in Tillamook City, Oregon, at the hour of 9 o'clock p.m. as the time and place for said viewers to meet for the purpose of making the assessment of damages and benefits arising out of the proposed extension of said street. All persons claiming damages by reason of the appropriation of any property which will be effected by such proposed extensions are hereby notified to file their claims for such damages with the City Recorder of Tillamook City, Oregon, on or before the time so appointed.

The boundaries and termini of the proposed extension, and the boundaries and descriptions of the private property proposed to be appropriated for said extension are as follows:

Beginning at the Southwest corner of Block 14, of A. A.
