SIX INITIATIVE BILLS TO GO ON BALLOT. Three Measures Referred by Last Legislature Will be Presented to Voters.

Salem, Ore., March 28.—At last six initiative petitions proposing constitutional amendments and laws and three measures referred to the people by the last Legislature will be on the ballot at the election next November.

Initiative petitions which will be on the ballot are as follows: To provide for one day of rest in seven and setting apart Sunday as a day of public rest.

Proposing law to "protect salmon in the Columbia River and its tributaries and baring fishing with seines, traps or fish wheels."

No. 12 proposes amending section 15 of article 5 of the constitution so as to give the Governor power to veto single items in appropriation bills.

No. 18, amending article 9 of the constitution, would exempt from taxation until 1935, except taxes for state purposes, all vessels of 50 tons and more capacity engaged in coast or foreign trade.

No. 22 proposes the repeal of section 6, of article 2, of the constitution which reads: "No negro, Chinaman or mulatto shall have the right of suffrage."

Washington, March 28.—As the Oregon & California land grant bill was finally agreed by the House committee on public lands today.

In all other particulars the bill agreed upon was the bill completed last night by the sub-committee.

Representative Ferris introduced in the House today the bill on which the committee has agreed, and as soon as printed this bill will be referred to the Attorney-General, Secretary of the Interior and Secretary of Agriculture for comment and suggestions.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Important Occurrences of Past Week Briefly Compiled for Our Readers.

Oregon's metal production for 1916 will exceed \$3,000,000 in value.

A co-operative cream shippers' association was organized at Dayton.

The Grangers of Linn county plan to open a public market in Albany.

A \$30,000 or \$35,000 school building is to be erected in the near future at Hood River.

An agitation is on in Morrow county for the improvement of the Heppner-Lexington road.

The Coos-Curry Cheese association was formed at a convention of factory owners in Coquille.

J. L. Stockton, of Salem, president of the Oregon Retail Merchants' association, has resigned.

"Oregon," a White Leghorn hen at the Oregon agricultural college, has laid her thousandth egg.

General resumption of all the idle lumber mills in Baker county is planned within the next few weeks.

As the result of mass meetings held last week, a beet sugar factory is assured for Sutherlin next year.

One hundred dollars in prizes will be given to the boy corn growers at the Wasco county fair next September.

A contract has been closed for the sale of 50,000,000 feet of Coos bay spruce lumber to the Russian government.

H. A. Ray and George Haff are reported to have discovered a ledge of sheelite tungsten three miles north of Gold Hill.

Governor Withycombe has issued a proclamation designating the first week in April "Western Club Women Consumers' Week."

For the week ending March 16, 188 accidents were reported to the state industrial accident commission, of which five were fatal.

Professor George Haskell Collier, one of the first members of the faculty of the University of Oregon, died at Eugene, aged 89 years.

Preliminary steps have been taken by the state association of county judges and commissioners to revise the road laws of Oregon.

An organization to be composed entirely of attorneys and to be known as the Oregon Naval Militia auxiliary will be formed at Portland.

Stock holders of the Willamette Valley Southern Railway company have voted an increase of \$500,000 in the capital stock of the company.

Cornelius Mowerson, a convict employed at the Oregon penitentiary as a trusty teamster, escaped while employed in work outside the prison.

PERSIAN GULF PEARLS.

The Divers Are Practically Slaves of the Boat Masters.

Bombay, noted for its pearl markets, is not a pearl producer, though the gems are bought there for shipment to all parts of the world.

Of this group of islands only those of Bahrein and Maharak are of any size. Their importance, however, is out of all proportion to their extent, for they are the great center of the Persian gulf pearl fisheries.

It is difficult for newcomers to obtain the services of good divers owing to the system in vogue, which practically makes this class of men slaves to the masters of the pearling boats.

SCRAPS AND A DINNER.

A French Chef's Feat With Food That Had Been Discarded.

A year or two ago I was chef in a country gentleman's household in England. The morning after my arrival I looked around the kitchen garden, and in the dust bin that stood in the back yard I saw a mixture of food that could have been turned into a first class dinner.

In about four quarts of milk that had turned sour were swimming stale half loaves, drumsticks of fowls, old ham bones, cold boiled potatoes, trimmings of dough made for plectrums, cracked eggs, some old codfish and some spoiled macaroni.

Next day I found a second consignment, very similar, about to be carried away and thrown out. I stopped this lot, sorted it out and, with the help of a little stock, half a dozen eggs and a hare that had been shot on the estate, served a seven course dinner for a family of ten that night, and the master of the household called me up and complimented me before the whole family on the best dinner they had had for a year.

Afterward his wife sent for me and told me that, though pleased with the dinner, she feared I had been too extravagant and said that her rule was not to allow more than 7 shillings per head in housekeeping.
