PERSIAN GULF PEARLS.

The Divers Are Practically Slaves of the Boat Masters.

Bombay, noted for its pearl markets, is not a pearl producer, though the gems are bought there for shipment to all parts of the world. The pearls sold in Bombay come from the Bahrein islands, a small archipelago on the western side of the Persian guif, which, although adjacent to territory under the control of Turkey, is governed by an independent sheik under special British protection, the British government maintaining a political agent there.

Of this group of islands only those of Bahrein and Maharak are of any out of all proportion to their extent, for they are the great center of the Persian guif pearl tisheries, which are the world's chief source of supply for pearls. The sheik of Babrein is said to nave a customs revenue amountmakes him the richest ruler in the Persian gult. The pearl fisheries upder his control may in a good year bring to his islands as much as \$2.
