**SCHOOL NOTES.**

**Pupils Improve in Spelling.**

The results of the last county spelling contest were quite gratifying. In the third grade eight pupils received 100; in the fourth grade eleven out of a total of eighteen received 100; in the fifth grade with somewhat of a larger registration twelve pupils received 100; nine in the sixth grade had perfect papers, as against none in the last spelling contest, and the seventh and eighth grades had two perfect papers each. These results were especially pleasing when it is considered that the lower classes of each grade have studied only one half of the words given in these contests, and that the teachers spend little if any time on the spelling in addition to what was spent before the contest began. In the High School out of a total of ninety-three taking the test twenty-two received 100, fourteen received 98 and twenty-five others above 90. This is a considerable improvement above the last contest.

**Brown Fur Boa Found.**

A brown fur boa was found in the west end of town by one of the pupils and may be claimed at the office by the loser.

**Garden Work Under Way.**

The pupils of the grade school are engaged after school and on Saturdays with their garden projects. Some have early vegetables coming up already and nearly all have some things planted. The school garden back of the school building is being prepared to receive the dahlia bulbs sent by Gill Bros. A number of pupils who have no home garden space will have gardens on this plot. This plot will soon be fenced.

**Spring Festival to be Given.**

It has been decided to give a spring festival early in May on the school lawn, when plays and games learned by the grade school children during the term will be presented to the public. A parents' day will be held at about the same time. The work of the schools will be on exhibition and parents especially invited to visit and examine the work and see work in progress.
