As a matter of economy, the office of city recorder and collector for the Water Commission was amalgamated but as Mr. Aschim resigned as city recorder, this will necessitate having two persons to fill these positions and at an extra expense to the city.

County Commissioner Fry and Johnson, of Clatsop County, stopped in Seaside on their return from the inspection of the new highway from Hamlet to the Tillamook County line that was graded last summer. They report the road in first class shape as a whole. There are a few slides as a result of the heavy snow and rain which will have to be attended to and when this is done and four bridges built the road will be ready for use. It is expected all this will be attended to by July 1 for summer travel. Graveling of the road will not be done until next year.

George Moskos vs. A. F. Coats Driving and Boom Company is a suit filed in the circuit court growing out of a contract for the construction of a logging road, plaintiff claiming the logging company is indebted to him to the amount of \$6,422.49.

The Eastern Jubilee Quartet gave an excellent musical entertainment at the city hall on Monday and Tuesday evenings, which proved a musical treat. The quartet was composed of four versatile colored entertainers, and the repeated encores showed how thoroughly the audience enjoyed the entertainment.

C. I. Clough has decided to erect a new concrete building on the lot now occupied by the Tillamook Meat Co. and Conover & Condit. Mr. Leach will locate his meat market in the new building now being erected by the First National Bank and the grocery store will be moved to the garage formerly owned by Ed. Snodgrass, which has been fixed up for the new store.

Judge George R. Bagley entered a decree in the case of Harriet M. Ford vs. Earl G. Ford, the former suing for divorce. Attorney T. B. Handley was appointed referee, who took the evidence, and it was upon these findings that the judge granted a dissolution of the marriage contract. There being no children born to the union, all property rights were settled between the parties.

A recital was given by the Junior pupils under the direction of Mrs. Koch, assisted by Frances Schrode. The object of the recital was to give the little ones confidence, and to show the mothers the work being done by the different pupils. Those taking part were Leonard Bales, Neville Smith, Lillian Groat, Mable Harrison, James Harrison, Marian Robison and Frances Schrode. Mrs. Koch finished the program by playing two of Chopins Waltzes, after which punch and wafers were served.

In an opinion given out by the Attorney General's office, in answer to a question from District Attorney Goynes, the Attorney General holds that Jewish people would not be entitled to receive their regular amount of liquor, even though the liquor was wanted for sacramental purposes. The Jewish People celebrate the pass-over this month at which ceremony wine is used in administering the sacrament. According to the Attorney General those who have received their two quarts will not be allowed to get more to celebrate this religious ceremony. The Attorney General also ruled that the provision in the law allowing 2 quarts of vineous liquor or 24 quarts of beer in one month, did not allow both, and one family can receive either the two quarts of booze or the 24 quarts of beer, but people will not be allowed to mix their drinks in any four week period.

To give those who are employed during the day and have no time to register during office hours, County Clerk Holden will open his office next Saturday evening at seven and remain open until 10 o'clock so as to accommodate those who have been unable to register for the above cause. Next Tuesday is the last day to register for the primary election.

County Principal's Club to Meet.

The Tillamook County Principal's Club will meet at Bay City Saturday, April 15. An interesting and valuable program is being arranged which everyone is invited to attend. The speaker of the day will be Dr. De Busk, an extension lecturer of the University of Oregon. A number of local men will speak and musical entertainment will be provided by Messrs. Humbert and Boyd. Another feature of the day will be the relay

race between Tillamook and Bay City between the Bay City High School boys and the Freshmen boys of the Tillamook High School. Each team will endeavor to deliver first to the Mayor of Bay City, a message from Mayor Brodhead of Tillamook. Each team will have seven runners, each of whom will run a portion of the distance in relay.

Clean-Up Day.

Mayor Brodhead has announced May 22nd to May 29th for a general clean up of the city. These are the dates that are set for a spring cleaning throughout Oregon, and Tillamook City needs it as bad as most other parts of the state. This means also the repainting of old buildings. The Women's Civic Improvement League will take an active part in the clean-up campaign, which is one method of beautifying the city. There are still a large number of old fences that should be torn out and old rotten sidewalks that should be replaced. It is expected that Tillamook City will make rapid strides from now on in civic improvements, although it is somewhat backward in that respect to other live and prosperous towns there is no reason why a decided advance cannot be made to beautify the city this year.

Dr. De Busk to Speak Saturday night

Dr. De Busk, of the University of Oregon Extension Service will speak Saturday night at the City Hall. Dr. De Busk will be remembered by all who heard him at the County Institute last fall, as one who spoke with unusual interest and intelligence on some popular sides of Physiology and Education. His subject has not been announced for this lecture but it can be counted upon to be both interesting and valuable. Dr. De Busk comes under the auspices of the Parent Teachers' Association. It is expected that the association will hold a short business meeting just before or just after the lecture. This lecture is entirely free. Everyone is invited to attend. Dr. De Busk is the first Extension Lecturer to come to Tillamook this year.
