Spotted or tick fever is appearing east of the mountains, and it is time to realize this is a filth disease. Not in the ordinary sense of actual dirt it is so, but in the unsanitary conditions that surround the development. At this season the tick is prevalent and secretes indigestion on the apparel, later to work underfoot and fasten itself to the body and grow large by sucking the blood. The fever results from the infection. Victims are those who sleep in clothing worn by day, for the simple reason that the man who kicks into nightshirt or pajamas discovers the insect. Also for the simple reason, women are not afflicted, for women are not lazy like men at bed-time. When found, the tick should be removed at once, with a drop of carbolic acid on the head if it is embedded. If the mouth breaks off it must be dug out. People who live in infested districts will profit by examining their bodies daily, and twice a day will be better, on retiring and arising.—Oregonian.

We Are Being Inspected.

Yamhill county is being inspected, all right. Since the opening of the late winter months the state agricultural college has sent us our county agriculturist, who is getting acquainted with the farmers and converting some of the more doubting Thomases as to his ability to do them any good. A survey of the county has been made by Mr. Hurd in which the leading products of 415 farms were ascertained and reported, determining the amount of the leading agricultural products grown on each farm, the probable surplus for marketing, place of marketing and price of product. The information is to be used in organizing and operating farmers' warehouses for which provisions have been made in some instances. Miss Turley will soon work us over in the interest of increased efficiency in house keeping, readjusting the kitchen of fair Yamhill in conformity with modern conditions. Mr. Keyes is already on the ground making a survey of bottom land farms, having completed a similar job for Tillamook county. Mr. Reynolds is organizing hog shipping associations, to enable farmers to market direct and get the benefit of all the value of their hogs less the transportation charges. Old Yamhill seems to be the first stamping ground for the extension service. It proves our superiority. If the serum works in Yamhill it is good for reputation of standing both to be fed and be milked, and her people are somewhat evenly divided as to which process is in progress. We can console ourselves with one thought, at least—if good comes from it, we will get something back for the taxes we are paying to support the propaganda.—Telephone Register.

And we have had the school inspector from the state superintendent's office, and the weights and measure inspector, the butcher shop and abattoir inspector, the fish and game inspector, the fire inspector, the highway inspector, the live stock inspector and a horde of other inspectors, but "devil a wan" have we seen of the fruit inspector. Will Continue to Practice Piracy

We may well suppose that President Wilson had fully decided what to do in the event that Germany refused to accede to his request to discontinue her piratical and barbarous warfare. Whatever the President had planned to do, may as well be done now. Germany will pursue barbaric courses, and will continue to murder our citizen travelers on the world's highways.

It appears that Germany never had any thought of giving up her piratical practices, and that President Wilson's triumphs of diplomacy bore merely dead sea fruit. In the Reichstag on Wednesday, the imperial chancellor, Count von Bethmann-Hollweg, discussing Germany's submarine warfare, made the following statement: "No fair minded neutral, no matter whether he favors us or not, can doubt our right to defend ourselves against this war of starvation, which is contrary to international law. No one can ask us to permit our arms of defense to be wrested from our hands."

We can accept this as official, as the speech was wirelessed from Berlin, after it had passed through the hands of the censor. The part of the imperial chancellor's address that is here quoted was delivered in the Reichstag and sent to this country for the instruction and enlightenment of an administration that for over a year has been fanatically celebrating a diplomatic victory every time the Germans have thrown a handful of dust in its eyes.

The German government never intended to abandon its submarine warfare, and von Bethmann-Hollweg declares that no fair minded neutral nation would ask it to do so. That was precisely what this nation asked, and for more than twelve months that is what we were told would be done. The imperial chancellor of Germany has made his instructive and illuminating speech, and the president of the United States has the next move.—The Spectator.

What Gasoline Really Is.

Gasoline was originally used for cleaning gloves and ejecting hired girls through the kitchen roof, but now has been taught a number of interesting tricks, such as running automobiles, motor boats, windmills, aeroplanes and the street cars. By the aid of gasoline we travel 150 miles an hour through the air, travel 60 miles an hour over land, and six feet in the ground with the greatest ease. A gal-

lon of gasoline can do as much work in an hour as a horse can do in a day, and it don't have to be fed at night.
