To Review the Hudson Road.

A. A. Arstall and John W. Fleck vs. Tillamook County is a writ of review filed in the circuit court this morning. Papers were served on the county by Attorney Webster Holmes, which is to review the action of the County Court in the matter of the J. J. Hudson road at Cloverdale.

At the March term of the County Court in the matter of the petition of J. J. Hudson and others for a county road, on the favorable report of the board of viewers, A. A. Arstall and John W. Fleck filed objections, but the County Court ordered the report of the viewers be adopted which gave the following damages: A. A. Arstall, \$405.00; Jenck Bos, \$457.50; Charles Johnson estate, \$22.50; John W. Fleck, \$255.50. The County Court ordered the road opened and established.

The plaintiffs now want the action of the County Court reviewed in this matter.
