Editorial Snap Shots.

We wonder whether Bottsville can tell us where Marxville is located, and whether they get any "brain storms" in the latter place.

The County Judge is putting in his time training for the round up. The county's new tin sissy bucked him into a ditch last week. "Let 'er buck," judge.

Chas B. Moores has announced himself a candidate for Secretary of State. He is certainly a good man for the position, and we wish him good luck, for he is a thorough Republican and opposed to Democratic free trade.

It is President Wilson's "watchful waiting" policy that is making ex-President Roosevelt a popular today, for the country needs a strong man at the head of the government who has some backbone, so sadly lacking in the President.

Most every candidate for the State Legislature favors fewer laws, but every two years a whole raft of new laws are added to the laws of Oregon. What's the matter with the Oregon System—with its dual system of passing laws?

As George Washington Kiger was declared to be the only honest witness in the auto case, he will be known as "Honest George" in the future, notwithstanding he resembled some cows when on the witness stand. The city attorney had some trouble in milking him for evidence.

There is this satisfaction that if any newspapers go broke on account of the great advance in the price of paper and printing material, the pencil pushers can go through the bankruptcy court. But that, to some extent, is a dishonest method of paying off one's debts.

It has been decided to drop the cases against those who were caught in the drag net for exceeding the city auto speed limit, there being about thirty persons who were charged with exceeding the 12 1/2 mile limit. The city won't get much revenue that way, but it is a very good illustration of enforcing the law for a few days and closing one's eyes other times at those who have been exceeding the speed law.

Bro. Trombley says, "Tillamook County has seen enough of Bitulithic pavement." Those who travel over the bitulithic pavement north of the city hold directly the opposite opinion. Ask any of the dairymen living in the Wilson river district and they will tell you Bro. Trombley don't know what he is talking about. The trouble with Tillamook County is that it hasn't enough of that kind of pavement.

Tillamook City has reached that stage of business importance where a fire limit should be established, and only concrete or brick buildings erected within the fire limit. This is a wise precaution for the city to take, and it should not be delayed. The city has been exceedingly fortunate in escaping from a serious fire, but with the buildings becoming more congested and the stocks of goods more valuable, it is proper to take precautions, the same as other towns.

We have published today the names of those who aspire to political office, whom the voters of Tillamook County will have to cast their ballots for at the primary nominating election on the 19th of May. Although a presidential year, there is not much interest thus far taken in the state election and for local offices it is about the same, but no doubt, there will be more enthusiasm before the day of election, at it is thought there will be a close race between some of the aspirants.

A visit to the public school shows the splendid opportunities the young people of this city and vicinity have of obtaining a good education, and they should take every advantage of it, the high school features certainly giving them advantages over districts which are still confined to the eighth grade. And in this connection we can say that Prof. Onthank and the teachers are doing good work in giving the pupils and young people splendid instruction. They have taken a lively interest in the school and the young people with good results.

Christian Science, truly is a wonderful invention, by its power, one can raise the dead or raise a mustard seed, yea, verily, it has been said that through its wonderful influence one might build anything from a mole hill to a profitable law practice. It has performed many weird and uncanny things. And after all that, the recorder's court at Bottsville fully and negligently failed and refused to take judicial notice of the effects of the mysterious formulae.

Zounds! Wake us up, we are a million years behind the times in Tillamook.

The newspapers in Washington county are having a lively time fighting office seekers' political battles, which appears to be getting more bitter every week. Bro. Fernsworth, of the Banks Herald is a candidate for the state legislature and the Hillsboro Independent "came back" at him by showing that the pencil pusher registered as a democrat two years ago and this year is registered as a republican. That is a bad showing for our young friend and if we knew anything about politics we don't think that he will become a bright and shining light in the next house, but the State Legislator does need some good newspaper men.

There is one thing that is not right. If an editor publishes falsehoods and misstatements about anyone, he can be sued for damages, but an attorney can get up in a court of justice and make all kinds of insinuations and actual falsehoods, but that is permissible in our courts of law. If the snap shot man made the same bad breaks as Attorney Marx did in the city recorder's office on Monday, he would expect to be sued for libel, and, no doubt, some attorneys would be glad of the opportunity to prosecute such a case. We are going to advocate that attorneys be prosecuted for damages when they make false accusations, for we do not think they should be a privileged class in this respect. For illustration, Attorney Marx made this glaring statement: "There was not one honest witness in this case who told the truth, except Kiger." The witnesses in the case were, for the prosecution, N. J. Myers, Don Newman, Edgar Munson, G. W. Kiger and W. J. Hill and for the defense Messrs Grimes, Gray and Patterson. According to Attorney Marx's assertion all these witnesses with one exception were dishonest and swore falsely on the witness stand, even his own witnesses. Most of our readers who witness law cases are of the same opinion as the snap shot man that attorneys have by far too much levity in courts of justice, which brings the law and attorneys who resort to abuse and false insinuations into bad repute with the people.

A recent issue of the Headlight contained a lengthy article from the pen of one Winthrop Hammond boasting bitulithic pavement, and Mr. Baker himself seems rather inclined toward the bitulithic trust. Of course Mr. Baker's attitude is to be expected. The fine Italian band of the Warren Construction Company can be plainly seen permeating the Headlight of the 6th inst. It seems to us that about the only argument necessary in regard to this question, is a careful consideration of our own pavement and its condition after a few years wear. Everybody, nearly, knows that a large amount of our bitulithic pavement has become absolutely rotten and that it has been necessary to patch and repatch it. It seems to us consummate gall on the part of anyone to argue in favor of bitulithic to Tillamook people.

We are inclined to believe that concrete pavement will give much better satisfaction if it is laid properly. Before Multnomah county issued bonds for hard surfaced roads, the Grange organizations of that county made an exhaustive investigation of the pavement question and came to the conclusion that concrete was the best, cheapest, and most economical pavement and reported their findings to Multnomah County Court, but for some reason not clear to all, bitulithic was adopted in a great majority of cases and most of their new roads were made of that material.

Tillamook county has seen enough of bitulithic pavement. We believe that most of our people are thoroughly converted to the cement pavement idea—Tillamook Herald.

The snap shot man does not fear or object to fair, honest criticism, but as Bro. Trombley has so frequently accused us of being in league with the Warren Construction Company we feel that it is time to get in and defend ourselves from such a bare faced perverter of the truth. It will be observed in the above article Bro. Trombley says: "The fine Italian hand of the Warren Construction Company can be plainly seen permeating the Headlight of the 6th inst. The snap shot man emphatically deny that the Warren Construction Company had anything to do, directly or indirectly, with what appeared in the Headlight of the 6th inst, but to give Bro. Trombley an opportunity to prove his false accusations, the snap shot man will give the Women's Civic Improvement League \$500.00 to help beautify the city if he can prove it. If he can't do so then every member of that organization will know that he is a sanguinary perverter of the truth. It does look exceedingly bad to see a man teaching a Sunday school class on Sundays and on week days writing and publishing false accusations. All good Methodists, all good Christians, and all non-church goers abort hypocrites, and if Bro. Trombley cannot land that \$500.00 for the Women's Civic Improvement League he will come under that head.

It is perfectly right and proper that the Headlight should discuss the matter of material for hard surfacing the county roads, especially as there is an agitation on foot to expend \$100,000 annually on hard surfacing the roads and a proposal to bond the county for \$420,000 for the same purpose. The snap shot man is also aware of the bitter and nasty fight that is going on in the state between different paving concerns, but the question for the taxpayers of Tillamook to decide is as to the lasting qualities of the different materials before any large amount of money is expended. This is the position that the snap shot man takes: In every contract that is awarded for hard-surfacing county roads it should stipulate that the contractor maintain the road for ten years and at the end of that time it should be in practically as good condition as when first laid, putting up a guarantee bond to

that effect. That is the kind of protection the taxpayers should have, for we know and have seen in different parts of the state where paving materials have not stood up properly and the property owners and taxpayers have been put to additional expense, which should have been paid by the contractors. Now is the time to safeguard the taxpayers and protect them from loss, not after contracts are let and hard surfaced pavement begin to deteriorate.

VON PAPAN AND FOUR OTHERS INDICTED.

Five Accused of Plot to Blow Up Canal.
New York, April 17.—Captain Franz von Papan, recalled military attache to the German embassy at Washington, was indicted today by the Federal Grand jury here as the organizer and financier of an alleged conspiracy to blow up the Welland Canal in Canada. With him also were indicted Captain Hans Tuscher, alleged agent of the Krupps in the United States and husband of Mrs. Johanna Galski the prima donna; Constantine Govani, Alfred J. Fritzen and another man whose name has not been revealed. It was learned from a reliable source that the last named is a prominent German whose name has been mentioned frequently in connection with German propaganda. His arrest is expected tomorrow.

Von Papan "Brains" of Conspiracy.
Von Papan was designated by Federal officials as the "brains" of the alleged conspiracy. It is alleged in the indictment that he, with the others, "began, set on foot, provided and prepared the means for a certain military enterprise to be carried on from within the territory and jurisdiction of the United States against the territory and dominions of the King of Great Britain, with whom the United States at all times mentioned was and is at peace."

The other three men whose names were made public were, according to the indictment, merely agents and employees of Von Papan, who planned the conspiracy and furnished the money and high explosives.

Attorney is Accused.
The five men alleged to have carried dynamite and other explosives in suit cases to Niagara Falls, where the plot was abandoned, were Horst von Der Goltz, also known as Franz Hobart Wachendorff, known also as Bridgeman Taylor; Fritzen, Govani, Carl Tuscher and Joachim Busz. John T. Ryan, an attorney and prominent in politics in Buffalo, N. Y., was named in the indictment as the man who acted as intermediary in the payment of money by Von Papan to Von Der Goltz. On two occasions in September 1914, it is alleged, Von Papan paid \$200 to Von Der Goltz through a Buffalo bank and Ryan. A previous payment of \$200 also is said to have been made to Von Der Goltz. Checks and check book stubs of these transactions are in the possession of the United States District Attorney.

Captain Tuscher, head of the Tauscher Arms Company here, supplied the explosives to Von Der Goltz, the indictment charges, while Von Papan furnished "electric generators, fuses and wires."
In August, 1914, according to the indictment, five sailors from the interned German liner Bavaria, at Baltimore, were brought to New York by the alleged conspirators to aid in the plot, but they were subsequently returned to their ship Arrangements then were made, it is charged, for the five men named in the indictment to undertake the expedition.

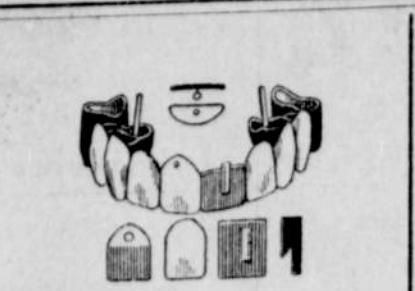
