It is told that a candidate once politely told all solicitors that applications for contributions or advertisements must be put in writing. He did not receive a single written application. No solicitor cared to put evidence against himself in black and white. Nor, so far as the candidate could discover, did not lose any votes.

The Day of Reckoning.

In its treatment of alien and citizen conspirators and mischief makers against its peace and dignity, this government has been gentle and lenient. For months, the government permitted the Austro-Hungarian ambassador to destroy the country's industries, and for more months it patiently bore with Captain von Papen's pernicious activities against our neutrality and prosperity.

Against the representatives of foreign nations who have abused our hospitality by attacking in public print and private letter our government and people, no action has been taken. Here is a letter, that is but a sample of many in which the writers show a distinctly unfriendly attitude toward us, whose author has neither been made to apologize nor leave the country for whose kindly tolerance he has such a poor regard.

"Imperial German Consulate, New Orleans, Dec. 4, 1915.—Dear Herr Von Papen: I read with great regret that the fate of the recall has indeed overtaken you. I don't suppose that you are very unhappy to be able to shake the dust of this unfriendly country from off your feet. What chiefly offends me is that, in always giving way to the government here, we have never found that they are kindly toward us.

That letter was found among the papers of Captain Von Papen, ex-attache of the German embassy at Washington, whose recall was demanded because of offensive activities against our neutrality and who is under indictment here for conspiring to blow up the Welland canal. It is supposed to have been written by Baron von Meyrenburg of the German consulate at New Orleans, who, unaccountably, is still permitted to use the United States mails to carry his hope that "the day of reckoning may come" for the United States as it has come for Belgium and Siberia.—The Spectator.

Schiller's Neutrality.

The following story that is going the rounds of the Continental papers, including even those of Austria, must make the Germans gnash their teeth. A German and a Dane met recently in Schiller's house in Weimar. As they stood gazing reverently on the scene the German, swelling with pride, remarked to his fellow-visitor: "So, this is where our national poet, Schiller lived?"

A Mountain of War Debt.

An impressive showing of the pace at which the belligerents are piling up war debts is made by the Wall Street Journal, which publishes the following table, giving the amounts in thousands of dollars:

Great Britain, France, Russia and Italy—Pre-war debt, \$17,465,000; war loans, \$19,842,500; present debt, \$37,307,500. Germany, Austria-Hungary and Turkey—Pre-war debt, \$9,808,000; war loans, \$9,176,500; present debt, \$18,984,500. A grand total of \$56,292,000.

The war had cost up to March 1 \$20,520,000,000, or at the rate of \$67,500,000 a day to the allies, and \$10,400,000,000, or at the rate of \$35,500,000 a day to the central powers, the grand total being \$30,920,000,000 or \$103,000,000 a day. The disparity between the cost of the three groups may be ascribed to the ample readiness of the central powers and to the great economy of their compulsory system as compared with the British voluntary system.

states things. But Free-Trade politicians, who have not the expert means of ascertaining causes as the Bradstreet's has, put all the blame on the war and give all the credit to Free-Trade. The political makeshift of a tariff commission is again to the fore. This time it is put forward by President Wilson. The thing has proven impractical thus far. Such a board was appointed in 1883 and it made very voluminous reports, but Congress made no use of it. President Taft had a commission made up mostly of Democrats, but its findings were entirely ignored by both parties in Congress, even by those who had "hollered" the loudest for it before election. The thing may have merit, but it is practically only chaff thrown out to catch the unwary.

The greatest number of industrial failures ever known for a like period in American history occurred in the United States in the year 1915 under free trade, and the biggest percentage of liquidation was in the South—the foster parent and political promoter of free trade.
