

TILLAMOOK SCHOOL NOTES

The fifth grade reports that Clara Myers, Jimmy Watson, and Herbert Jones have been neither absent nor tardy since school began this year.

A vote of appreciation and thanks was given to McGhee's orchestra and a committee was appointed to select a token of appreciation for Miss Gaylord who played the piano for the operetta.

The reports this last six weeks showed a decided improvement in scholarship over the first six weeks of the term. There were no grades as low as some were the first six weeks and the average was considerably improved.

The last monthly report shows that the attendance has fallen off slightly owing to the removal of a few families but the percentage of attendance has increased from 96 to 97. There was much less absence and tardiness than in the previous month. There now remains but five weeks of school the date set for the closing of school being May 26.

The Glee Club has recently purchased about \$50 worth of Victrola records, most of those from grand operas. The funds for this were raised by the operetta, recently given by the club. The club also authorized the purchase of additional music for the use of the club, a picture for the music room of the high school, and diverted \$25 to help pay for the concrete tennis court now under construction by the students of the high school.

The Senior Play in Preparation.
The senior class is preparing its play "A Strenuous Life." The date set for this production is May 12. This play is somewhat the same as the one given last year by the senior class. Advertising material will soon be issued by the class.

Commencement Speaker Secured.
Dean D. W. Mowen, of the New School of Commerce, of the University of Oregon, has promised to deliver the commencement address to the senior class on commencement night, May 26. Dean Morton, who is new in the state is said to be a speaker of unusual ability, and the school feels very fortunate in being able to secure him for this address.

School Builds Tennis Court.
The students of the high school have been laboring for several weeks on the concrete tennis court for the use of the high school students. The funds for this is being raised in various ways. The vaudeville given Tuesday night at the Gem Theatre netted about \$50. The Glee Club has contributed \$25 and the balance is being raised by membership fees and small sums from other high school funds. The total cost will be about \$160, of which \$45 is yet to be raised. The labor has been done wholly by the boys of the school and some members of the faculty, with the exception of the surfacing which was superintended by Contractor Dolan. A crew of students and faculty worked all day Saturday laying concrete. At noon the girls of the tennis club provided a dinner in the Domestic Science rooms, to which ample justice was done by the workers. This court is a permanent addition to the school property and without cost to the district.

Scholarship Race Closes.
During the last six weeks there has been a contest between the boys and girls of the Freshmen and Sophomore classes, respectively, in scholarship and attendance, scholarship counting two-thirds and attendance, one-third. The averages were made up during the last week showing that the Sophomore girls won over the Sophomore boys by only 7 per cent, and the Freshmen girls over the Freshmen boys by only .82 per cent. This was a very close race indeed, so close that the boys are hoping to turn it the other way in the contest for the remaining five weeks of school. Of the Sophomore girls Agnes Coates has an average in scholarship of 92, Georgia Johnson 93, Gertrude Ball 92, and Hazel Lamar, Ethyl Summerlin and Grace Wade 90 each. Of the boys Charles Lamb had an average of 95 and Howard Williams an average of 90. The Sophomore girls averaged 86 1/2 in scholarship and 97.9-10 in attendance. The following Freshmen girls averaged 90 or above in scholarship: Edna Anderson, Bertha Blanchard, Mary Ullman, Hazel Klinehan, Amy Jenkins and Pearl Chase. Of the boys Henry Anderson and Herman Jacob averaged 92, James May and Emerald Tilden 90, Edwell Erskine and Joe Schnal 93, Arthur Brewster 94 1/2. The Freshmen boys averaged 84.9-10 in scholarship and the girls 86.5-10. The boys, however, had the better attendance record.
