Editorial Snap Shots.

The business men of Tillamook will be glad to offer the glad hand to the business men of Hillsboro when they come to this city.

Bro. Trombley has failed to make the snap shot man cough up that \$500.00 for the Women's Civic Improvement League. Hush, hush. It is said that Bro. Trombley is down on his marrow bones asking forgiveness for publishing such untruthful statements.

The suggestion to dedicate the new city hall on the Fourth of July is a good one. A good rousing, patriotic celebration will be perfectly in order in every city this year, as a protest to hyphenated citizenship and give the people an opportunity to show their loyalty, first, last and all the time to the United States and the Stars and Stripes. Sure, Tillamook City will have a celebration on the Fourth, and we hope it will be made a county affair, and we hope it will be one of the largest patriotic gatherings ever held in Tillamook County.

We are going to ask a few pertinent questions:

Are you doing anything to beautify the city and your own home?

Have you cleaned up that muss about your back yard?

Wouldn't a coat of paint improve your residence or business premises?

Have you planted any dahlias bulbs this year?

Are you taking an active part in the Women's Civic Improvement League?

Are you going to help the new commercial organization?

Are you a booster or a chronic knocker or a drone who won't help or assist in business and civic improvements?

Lots of lawing this week in this city, which is another illustration of the high cost of living, for it takes lots of the taxpayer's money to settle the troubles of litigants who rush into court with trivial suits. There are cases at the term of court that should not be on the docket, and they would not be there if it wasn't for the activities of attorneys who drum up cases and cause trouble. But, then, as long as the taxpayers have to foot the bills for that class of litigation this will continue. Yet it is wrong to make the overburdened taxpayers "cough up" additional taxation. Well, as one of our prominent citizens remarked half starved attorneys have to live.

Quite a number of the business men have assured the new president of the Commercial Club of their support in the effort to conduct a live business organization in this city. Are you one of those who will put your shoulder to the wheel and help push it along? It is united effort of the business men as well as the ladies, that will make this a live business and beautiful city. Don't stand on the street or in your office or store and knock, because this or that does not please you. Forget it and bury the hatchet, for the city needs your help and the club your co-operation. Show a magnanimous, broad minded disposition in civic affairs, but don't knock, knock, knock. Cut it out and be a booster for a better and bigger business city, as well as a city that is attractive and made beautiful with flowers.

A few Democratic papers throughout the state are reprinting an article from the "Oregon Voter" regarding Olcott's Republicanism. Here are one or two facts that are not contained in the article. Olcott was appointed to a position in Portland by Governor Chamberlain. When Oswald West made his campaign for governor, Ben Olcott was his campaign manager and it is said he contributed to the fund that elected West. A little later, Secretary of State Benson died and West promptly appointed his henchman to fill the unexpired term, overlooking the capabilities of Sam Kozier who had been chief deputy in the office of the Secretary of State for many years. The boasted efficiency in the office of Secretary of State under Ben Olcott is no greater than it was under his predecessor and both conditions are due in large measure to deputy Kozier who is a sterling Republican and therefore stood no chance of receiving an appointment from a Democratic Governor. These are some of the facts regarding Olcott's Republicanism which voters should not overlook.

We are sorry, in showing our inability to ward off the potato blight last year, the snap shot man should have stepped on the Agriculturist's corns. We thought, probably, we might, but the snap shot man had a double purpose in view, and that was to call attention to the annual attacks on potato vines by the blight and to see whether a concerted plan cannot be devised to overcome it. Anything appearing in the editorial snap shots is sure to create some comment, and criticism, because so many persons read the snap shots every week. The snap shot man religiously followed the County Agriculturist's instructions last year, but when the blight made an attack on the northwest section of our potato patch it captured about half of it. Two weeks later the blight made another attack on the southwest front and took the whole potato patch by storm. The snap shot man is not disheartened, for he is going to follow religiously the County Agriculturist's instructions and advise others to do the same. Results will tell whether this year's instructions will be any more successful than last year's hope to defeat the attacks of the potato blight. We hope it will. If it doesn't, then it is up to the snap shot man to "come back" at the County Agriculturist.

Pat McArthur, representative for the third district, has brought suit against R. P. Hutton, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Oregon on a charge of libel, placing the damage at \$50,000. It is safe to say that Hutton is irresponsible as far as money is concerned, and to obtain a verdict against him seems like wasting good money and time of the courts. Hutton should be prosecuted criminally by the District Attorney of Multnomah, for a jail sentence is justly due him should he be found guilty, which, no doubt, he would be, for it appears to us that he has openly violated the corrupt practice law in circulating libelous circulars about the congressman. A bootlegger may be considered a bad citizen, and so is the superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League for publishing libelous matter. Both need jail sentences to cure the whole affair, it appears to be the church people that are backing Hutton and paying him a salary to violate the law. Oh, yes, enforce that law.

The primary election law requires that where there are five or more candidates for one office the names are to be rotated, so as to give each candidate the same advantage of having his name at the top of the list. For illustration, where there are fifty ballots required for one precinct, and there are five candidates for an office, ten ballots will have to be printed with the name of one candidate at the top of the list. There are thirty precincts in Tillamook County. On the Progressive ticket the ballots will have to be rotated five times for each precinct, making 150 in all. On the Democratic ticket the ballots will have to be rotated 13 times, making 390. On the Republican ticket the ballot for each precinct will have to be rotated 19 times making 580. For the three tickets the ballots will have to be rotated 1120 times making that many different kinds of ballots. In addition to this there are numerous changes for Ports, Justice and Constable districts, and added to this the official ballots have to be perforated and each stub numbered. Anyone who knows anything about the printing business see at once that it is a long and tedious job to print the primary nominating election ballots, but in some other counties the rotation is much more than in this county owing to more candidates.

We are not in favor of boycotting, but it seems to us that the business men of Portland should boycott the yellow evening newspapers of that city. Their continual abuse of public officials is a disgrace to journalism and that city, as well as the state. They are simply knockers of the worst kind, not only attempting to besmirch the characters of men in public life, but injuring Portland and the state in obtaining new industries and people to locate in Oregon. It is money thrown away to assist the Chamber of Commerce and other kindred organizations, which are endeavoring to develop Portland and the state at large as long as that kind of yellow journalism prevails in Portland. One is endeavoring to do its best to advertise the state, while the other is doing a whole lot of harm in its repeated knocking antics. We cannot see how Portland can support a lot of knocking evening newspapers and commercial organizations at the same time and be consistent. Better, by far, cut one or the other out and refuse it support until such time as they can work together. But is it possible that the business men of Portland favor the yellow evening newspapers of that city? It looks that way, by the support they give them.

Who is responsible for the great increase in taxation the past few years? Some blame the legislature and others this and that. We believe it is the people, as much as anybody, who is responsible, and the slick politicians. Some years ago it was freely stated that if the people would adopt the Oregon System it would put a stop to all the political ills and reduce taxation. The slick politicians made that their slogan and they rode into office, and the people adopted the Oregon System, with its dual system of legislation as well as class legislation. But instead of taxes being reduced they mount higher every year, notwithstanding that the Oregon System is in full force and effect. The conservative element who opposed the Oregon System when it was first advocated saw that it placed a power in the hands of those who were not taxpayers to oppress those who paid the taxes. It is working out that way, for whenever there is a vote taken to bond or increase taxes for this and that, it invariably carries. There is no disputing the fact that the Oregon System fosters class legislation. Another thing that the people are responsible for, and that is electing politicians to responsible positions and not business men. The West regime was a disgrace to the state and to send two Senators to Washington to place most everything we raise in Oregon on the free list in competition with foreign labor, is a stab in the back at every industry in Oregon. And West-Chamberlain-Lane and others rode the Oregon System hobby horse and the people elected them. Don't blame the State Legislature and County Courts for increase in taxation—blame the people. Yet, what's the use of complaining, the Oregon System and the dear people we heard so much about in recent years will see to it that taxation will not decrease, but will increase. Well, the people have got what they wanted and voted for and if they have any kick coming they should kick themselves; for the Oregon System is fixed so nicely and working so smoothly to bring about additional taxation every year, that another kind of system is needed to kill off the system of increased taxation.

CLUB EXCURSION TO TILLAMOOK.

Two Day Trip Planned on Special Train.

Hillsboro will extend the glad hand to Tillamook and intervening points either in the last week of May or first week in June. Plans for an excursion of business men and their friends to the neighboring coast city have been in progress during the winter and have reached a point that the announcement was made this week by President Mahon that the excursion was an assured fact. While the event is promoted by the Commercial Club those making the trip will not be restricted to members of the organization. Reservations may be made by any person and they will be accepted until the limit of 100 persons has been filled. It is probable that Thursday and Friday will be the days selected, which will permit business men to return and care for Saturday business. A special train of the Southern Pacific's best equipment will be supplied, and it is expected to include an observation car for the accommodation of those wishing to view the scenery over the mountains. The train being a special will stop when desired, and the program provided not only for stops at all the towns on the route, but also to visit to mills and logging camps to give the excursionists a view of actual operations. Thursday night will be spent in Tillamook and return made the next day with stops at the beach resorts. The price of tickets, which include railroad fair, hotel bills, etc., has been placed at \$6.50 and the promoters urge persons desiring to join the party to register at once.—Hillsboro Independent.

T. B. POTTER IS DEAD.

Former Portland Realty Operator in California.

Thomas Benton Potter, 51 years old well known in Portland as a large realty operator a few years ago, died at Alameda, Cal., Saturday night. The funeral will be held there. Mr. Potter with H. L. Chapin, formed the Potter-Chapin Realty Co. in this city in 1907. The firm planned the summer resort at Bayocan, which property they proceeded to put on the market. Later Mr. Chapin passed out of the company and the firm continued under the name of the T. B. Potter Realty Company. Operations at Bayocan were planned on an extensive scale and the project was a pretentious one. A fine hotel was built and streets paved. In June, 1910, Mr. Potter suffered a severe physical breakdown, from which he never recovered. He was taken to Europe, where specialists were consulted, but no relief was obtained. He retired to his home in California, where he has quietly spent the time since his return to this country.

T. Irving Potter, 544 East Twenty-third street North, Portland, president of the Coin Machine Manufacturing Company, is a son. He left the city Friday to hurry to his father's bedside, as indications of the approaching end were noticed.

His widow, Frances L. Potter, survives and two sons, T. Irving and O. Potter, also two daughters, Mrs. Faney Johnson and Mrs. J. L. Dobbins, both of whom are in China.—Oregonian.
