Ireland's Made-in-Germany Revolt.

The revolt in Ireland was so closely confined to Dublin and so quickly suppressed that it did not attain the dignity of the rebellion that the Germans hoped they had fomented. It was the uprising of a few fanatical Fenians whose hopes of a separate kingdom or republic of Ireland were played on by Germany to embarrass Great Britain.

The revolt was doomed to inevitable failure everyone, including those who financed it, must have known. Indeed, it could be regarded as a ridiculous fiasco were it not for the destruction of life and property that attended it. The great mass of the Irish people were not in sympathy with the uprising, and all efforts to instill their active or moral support in it failed utterly.

The Dublin revolt was managed from Germany. Its Irish leader, Sir Roger Casement, found asylum there, procured their arms and money for its prosecution, and with a shipload of munitions of war sailed from that country under convey of a German submarine. The vigilance of the British patrol service prevented the landing of the arms, secured the arrest of Casement, and made of what Germany had tried to make a rebellion more than a riot.
