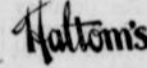

Some of the classes are planning picnics or parties. The teachers have been busy with tests and reports. Superintendent Onthank has been giving special tests in spelling, language, and arithmetic to determine the progress made in the fundamentals of these to determine the progress made during the year. Progress had been shown in every grade and in a number of cases standard performances had been greatly exceeded. In the Courts—Standard Arithmetic Test which were given last fall and again this spring to determine the progress made in the year, efficiency has been increased greatly. One girl, Letha Carr broke all known records in one division at this test by solving correctly in six minutes problems which a trained adult is not expected to do in eight minutes. Others made splendid showing although none has as good as hers.
