Editorial Soap Shots.

That's bad business—double crossing.

Favorite sons did well in Tillamook on Friday, Attorney T. B. Handley and Russell Hawkins obtaining flattering majorities.

No doubt there will be several independent candidates in the coming election, for already there is a movement on foot to have others run for some of the offices.

We understand that an effort is to be made by some of the leading Republicans at Nehalem to drop their little petty jealousies and unite on Mr. Keed for county commissioner. That looks like good common sense, for there is no reason why Republicans in that part of the county should be at loggerheads.

The snap shot man is firmly of the opinion that the \$15,000 appropriated for the Bayocean road should be expended on that road and not used for road work in other places. Apply that amount of money elsewhere it will mean that much more money to be appropriated in the next budget which is not a very good way to economize. In fact, it is an exceedingly bad precedent, for we contend that if the budget contains certain amounts for certain roads and certain bridges the money should be used on them and not diverted for different purposes.

Now that the primary nominating election is over, no one can accuse the snap shot man of publishing anything that would injure the characters or reputations of any of the local aspirants. Most of the aspirants have commended us for keeping out of the local fight. It was somewhat difficult to do so, more especially when we heard persons say that which was not true about some of the aspirants, for the "cheerful liar" was in evidence, as usual, and those who endeavored to besmirch the characters of those who sought office were busy.

The snap shot man had a little controversy with one of our subscribers about the increase in taxation. He was one of those who honestly believed that the Oregon System would result in less taxation. We asked him if he voted for the eight hour law, which increase the cost of road work and which resulted in a number of city, county, and state employes being allowed to work only eight hours and draw pay for ten hours. He answered "yes." We told the gentleman as politely as we knew how that he was one of those who helped to make taxes higher and was the last person who should complain.

We wonder how office seekers construe this divine law: "Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's house, thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's wife, nor his servant, nor his maid, nor his ox nor his ass, nor anything that is his."

The decalogue can only be construed in one way. If a person is holding office and another person covet the position, the latter is breaking the commandment. The decalogue is followed in our organic law to a large extent, for it is unlawful to commit murder or adultery, steal or bear false witness. So what about those who covet another fellow's job?

Netarts election board beat every election board in the county to a frazzle for smartness. Although seven miles from Tillamook, the ballot boxes and election returns were in this city a few minutes after eight o'clock. In fact, when the result of the election was phoned to this office a few minutes after eight o'clock we were already in possession of the figures in that precinct. Other election boards will wonder how the impossible could happen but it did, and it is up to our readers to guess how Netarts put on such lightning speed and how Charley Wells became such a lightning striker in carrying ballot boxes from Netarts in quicker time than telephone.

Having butted into the Republican primary in advocacy of Judge Bagley, will the Herald, the Democratic organ, support Attorney S. S. Johnson, the Democratic nominee for circuit judge, or Judge Bagley the Republican nominee at the general election? That depends, whether F. R. Beals assumes the office of editorial scribe of the Herald, as he did in the primary election. The snap shot man was a little anxious to "come back" at the inspired articles, for we have enough evidence in our possession that would have punctured them full of holes. We had decided to keep out of the fight, which we did. But we lost some fun by doing so, for that was just the kind of fight we like to get into once in a while and when we have the proper ammunition.

The last two elections have shown

that the voters of Tillamook County are opposed to long time terms for county officials. Two years ago a fight was made on Sheriff Crenshaw and last week the same arguments were put up against County Clerk Holden, that they had been in office too long. Tillamook County never had more eminent officers than these two gentlemen who can retire from public service with the consciousness that they served the people conscientiously and well. It is a warning to those who are elected next November that their tenure of office will be for a few years only. This is the will of the voters and office holders will have to abide by it. We notice that it was in the county precincts where the prejudice is strongest against long time terms for county officials.

We heard a person make a remark Saturday that H. S. O. Keed was elected county commissioner he would put a bridge across the Nehalem river from Dean's point to Wheeler. The person was misinformed and was circulating that which was not true. Even before Mr. Keed had any intention of running for county commissioner, it was his opinion that the location of certain roads and bridges in the Nehalem country should be left to disinterested persons and practical engineers, and whatever their decision is he was willing to abide by. Mr. Keed made this clear to a number of the voters when he went through the county. It was the State Engineer's department that went over the Three Rivers and Little Nestucca roads to decide which was the best route for the highway into Tillamook County, and it was decided that the Little Nestucca road was the best and would benefit more settlers. That settled the dispute in the South part of the county, and the Little Nestucca road will be built and become the highway. We see no reason why the stricte that so often takes at Nehalem cannot be settled in the same manner. It should be. Mr. Keed is wise in advocating that the State engineer or some independent person be called up to decide when the time is ripe to build more bridges and roads at Nehalem. Too much money has been wasted in building roads to benefit a few persons.

Dentists Make an Examination of Children's Teeth.

Drs. Peterson, Olson and Allen made last week a second examination of the teeth of the children in the Tillamook schools from the second to the eighth grades inclusive. This was done by the dentists without charge. The tabulations of the reports made by the doctors has not yet been completed, but already it shows that there has been a marked improvement in the teeth of the children, who have been in school during the year since the last examination. There are more children who need no dental attention, and even a larger proportion who need only slight attention, as compared with the large number last year whose mouths were in a serious condition. There are still a good many children, however, with several permanent teeth already decayed, and more whose temporary teeth through lack of attention are likely to cause, or already have caused trouble with the following permanent teeth. Many people do not realize that the decayed roots of the temporary teeth are almost certain to cause trouble with the permanent teeth which should grow where these roots are hanging. A number of pitiful cases were found where children's mouths were deformed by having permanent teeth turned to one side by such decayed roots. Reports on the conditions of the mouths has been sent by the dentists to the parents of the children.
