RESULT OF PRIMARY NOMINATING ELECTION.

Handley, Goynes, Campbell, Harrison, Shreve and Reed Win Out in Contests.

The primary nominating election Friday passed off quietly, but not without some bad blood and numerous rumors of independent candidates. The local candidates who won out on the Republican ticket where there were contests gave T. B. Handley the nomination for State Senator; T. H. Goynes, district attorney; W. L. Campbell, sheriff; Erwin Harrison, county clerk; R. L. Shreve, surveyor; and S. G. Reed for county commissioner. The other aspirants who were nominated without opposition were G. B. Lamb, school superintendent; B. L. Marx, treasurer; C. A. Johnson, assessor; and S. M. Wendt, coroner.

Notwithstanding that a strong fight was made for circuit judge, state auditor, county clerk, sheriff and county commissioner, there was not a vote, as only 75 per cent of those registered went to the polls. The surprising thing in connection with the gathering of election figures was the surprising short time it took the returns and ballot boxes in Netarts to reach this city. The election closed at eight o'clock and a minutes past that time the ballots were counted and were in this city.

The election did not pass off without some friction, and in this connection Attorney T. H. Goynes owes his nomination to those who had lined up the "wets" in previous elections. It seems that they had promised Attorney Marx support if he would give his support to Chester Holden. The wets carried out their agreement along about noon they found out Marx was not acting up to his promise. A few ballots were discarded that Marx had marked for vote by and it was found he had double crossed the "wets" instead of having the ballots marked for Chester Holden, they marked for Erwin Harrison. To no mistake two parties were up to the office of Clausen and each returned with their ballots marked for Erwin Harrison. The ballots popped at once, and a good strong expressions were made of duplicity of the game. The wets then got busy and turned their backs to Goynes, and by throwing in 49 and 50 votes to the "dry" they he won out by a small margin. This is liable to result in a Harrison if a suitable person found who will run as an independent candidate. That, we understand, is the present plan, and time will tell whether it will materialize, may not amount to anything, but are always more or less suspicious after nominations have been made.

As Clark Hadley, W. J. Stephenson, Rogers, Small and others wanted the "dry" band wagon tried it to victory for Goynes. Congratulations Goynes when they he had won.

Goynes is grooming him for district attorney. He is connected with Attorney Marx for six months, and their agreement will expire the next month.

Not about the election was a rising opposition that developed County Clerk Holden. Those who had him put up the argument he had been in office long and did not confine themselves to the truth. He has made the County Clerk the county ever double the work to attend

It is being made to induce persons to run for County Clerk. He had intended doing so, but other candidates made their movements, and feels sorry now he did not do so. It is reported that persons have promised to work for him, but he has not up his mind what to do. There was some difference of opinion as to number of railroad men to be voted, and District Attorney being sent for he decided to vote. The Tillamook Headlight is going to the precinct to obtain the vote. The next day obtained from every precinct but the one was Wilson, but there were six votes cast there. From the county came inquiries

as to the result of the election, and at this office Friday night and Saturday a large number of persons congregated and were anxious to obtain the result of the election.

JEMMY MADISON.

"Withered Little Applejohn," Irving Dubbed the President.

"What presidents we might have had, sir!" a Washington barber lamented soon after Jefferson went out of office. "Just look at Daggett of Connecticut or Stockton of New Jersey! What cues they have got, sir! As big as your wrist and powdered every day like real gentlemen, as they are. But this little Jim Madison, with a cue no bigger than a pipstems, sir! It is enough to make a man forswear his country."

Short and wrinkled, with a cast in his eye and a voice scarcely audible in public speaking, the new president did not make a good impression as he began his inaugural address. He was pale and "trembled excessively," and the swaying motion of his body and all the peculiarities of his poor delivery, including his air of having risen casually and with no intention of making a speech and desiring above all things to escape, were as annoying as usual. But he gained poise as he proceeded, and Jefferson was convinced that his friend would develop equal assurance in dealing with the problems of his administration.

That night at Long's hotel in Georgetown, where guests thronged to the first inaugural ball in the country's history, the former president was in evidence again, joyous and smiling,
