Delegates from both lodges will go to Portland for the Supreme Lodge convention and will endeavor to make a good showing for this county. The meeting of the two lodges was in the form of a district convention, which was presided over by Otto Effenberger, of Nehalem. Other visitors from Nehalem were O. F. Knight, O. J. Yamhill and Tillamook Counties for the use and benefit of Frank Retondo, vs. Tillamook Bay Construction Co., and the United States Fidelity & Guaranty Co., is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover \$7,117.22 from the defendant. The Tillamook Bay Construction Co. was awarded the contract to construct what is known as the Sour Grass Road, and on the 1st of August, 1915, entered into a contract with Frank Retondo to do certain work, which was agreed to by both county courts. It is claimed that Retondo removed 10,803 cu. yards of earth, amounting to \$3,936.73; removed loose rock to the amount of 8,930.3 cu yards, amounting to \$3,393.51; removed solid rock to the amount of 3,585.9 cu yds, amounting to \$2,151.54 making in all \$9,481.77, all of which is due and owing Retondo with the exception of \$2,364.55.

### HOLSTEIN MILK EXPERIMENT

#### Jersey and Other Breeds Lead in First Month.

The difference of opinion between those who own Holstein and Jersey cattle will soon be settled. It was claimed by the Holstein cattle men that that breed would produce more cheese, but the Jersey men argued the other way. To settle the point, the Holstein dairymen installed a vat at the cheese factory of the Fairview Dairy Association, and the milk from the Holstein cattle was placed in it and made into cheese, while the milk from the Jersey and all other breeds was placed in other vats and made into cheese. This is to be continued for six months, and if the results for the six months are the same as the first month, the Holstein men will have to admit that their arguments do not hold good when tried out, for they are slightly behind in the first round. We give below the result of the first month, which will be of great interest to most dairymen.
