AGRICULTURAL NOTES.

Tillamook Bull Increasing in Value.
Every official record made by the dam, grand-dam or any near relative of a registered dairy bull adds value to that bull by enlarging his production pedigree.
The following information was received, lately, from Hollywood Farm, Washington, regarding the dam and sire of Holstein bull belonging to J. J. Rupp.
Artis Hengreveld De Kol 3rd's Girl, the dam of the bull, finished her yearly record on May 21st. She produced 20 752.5 lbs. of milk containing 907.8 lbs. butter.
The sire of the bull has 24 sisters whose average records as junior 2 year olds is 1812 lbs. butter in 7 days. One of these sisters, Hollywood Faine Fayne, holds the highest junior 2 year old record in the Northwest for 7 years, 2351 lbs. butter, average test 4.05 per cent. Another sister, Hollywood Vale Fayne made 21,600 lbs milk and 846 lbs butter in a year as a junior 2 year old.
We need more stock of this kind in the county.

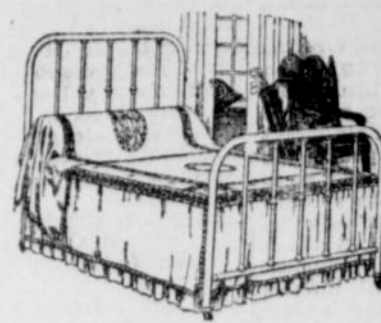
Save Your Rennets.
There has been much agitation of late in all the cheese localities of this county regarding the scarcity of rennet and the consequent rise in the price of the extract.
We have always depended, almost altogether, on the European countries for our supply. This supply is now cut out.
Are The Tillamook Factories Going To Run Out of Rennet on Account of This War?
Rennet extract is prepared from the 4th stomachs of young calves. The calf should be a few days old and fed nothing but pure milk. When the calf is killed the fourth or true stomach should be removed. This is the last stomach, the one that empties into the small intestines. It is the stomach that often contains the milk curd. Remove it carefully by cutting where it joins the next stomach, called the book and squeeze out the contents. Then cut off the thick muscular part of the neck (not over 2 inches) and slit open so that it will lay flat.
The best part of the rennet is the end where it joins the book, so be sure not to lose any part of it, if you want the top price. Do not wash the inside with water.
Stretch the rennet well and salt heavily on both sides right away, then leave a day or two to drain, in a cool place. There must be plenty of salt left on both sides.
Keep the salted rennets in a cellar or other cool place until shipped, to prevent spoiling, and pack in tubs or boxes. Be sure to have the rennets drained off well before shipping, so they will not leak brine in transit, and please reduce the shipping weight as much as possible.
Do not ship too much extra salt.
Where only a few rennets are gotten each week, the best way to do, after salting and draining for a couple of days, is to hang them up to air dry. Be sure to have a good circulation of the air, and, at all times, do not fail to have plenty of salt on both sides of the rennet. After drying they will keep for almost any length of time, and can be shipped in a bag or box.
Blown rennets command a little higher price and are prepared as follows: The rennet stomach should be turned inside out and any particles of food shaken or picked off. Do not wash. Tie up one end of the stomach and blow up like a bladder. Hang in a cool place, away from flies to dry. Be sure to keep them in a cool and dry place.
Prices quoted by one firm are from 13 to 15 cents per rennet, but with the present shortage much higher prices are expected. The cheese authorities of this county are seriously considering the manufacturing of their own rennet extract. If they do this, it will create a market right here at home and keep more of our money here. Save the rennets.
Turn Weeds Into Money.
Our common weed, fox-glove, is the same as the drug Digitalis which is used extensively as a heart stimulant. In Europe the plant is cultivated and sold for this purpose. At present the European supply is cut off and the market is good for this drug.
The leaves should be gathered from plants in bloom and dried in the shade. They should be stirred frequently so that they will dry evenly and not get musty. Do not save the leaves from plants not in bloom as they do not contain enough of the drug to make it worth while. If you include these in your shipment it would probably spoil the market for you in the future.
Here is a chance to turn this troublesome weed into money. Set the boys and girls at it and at the same time rid your pasture of it.
I have inquired from several drug manufacturing houses as to market possibilities and quotations; and should have these in a few days. Ordinarily the dried leaves bring from 10 to 12 cents per pound.
