"War is hell" but job-destroying, home-wrecking, happiness-demolishing, comfort-killing is free trade.

Free trade taxes home industry to make up for the present it hands to foreign industry. Why not reverse such an un-American scheme,

We pause to note the completion of the "Gyroscope Gun" that is guaranteed to shoot 5,000 bullets a minute. Such a rapidly demolishing deadly implement ought to prove almost as fatal as free trade.

It would seem to be good horse sense to realize that protection for American workers gives work and wages at home, and that free trade urges American workers out of work, and puts a tax mortgage on their small possible incomes.

Let the slogan of every voter in the coming national election be: "A speedy repeal of the Underwood Tariff law, and the enactment in its place of a tariff law that will restore the American labor and industry their full rights in the American market."

The free trade tariff has proven a dismal failure as a revenue producer. It permits 71 per cent of our imports to come in free and thus make our shoes the dumping ground of the products of foreign cheap labor, which gives a black eye to our own workmen.

An adequate protective tariff means to the workers in America potteries will not be obliged to compete with the same class of workers in Japan at 34 cents a day for eleven hours work. Pottery workers, keep your eyes open and plaster free trade to your hearts' desire.

The fact that in the first ten months of the Underwood free trade tariff our imports increased nearly \$102,000,000, while our exports decreased nearly \$159,000,000, is an irrefutable argument that the war is solely the cause of the present stimulation of trade in the United States.

In the columns of a free trade contemporary there is an interesting summary of the German exports to his country. With all the restrictions of war, the mighty British fleet being the chief, Germany sends us more than \$100,000 worth of shipments a month. If the soldiers were back at work, and the British fleet were at sea, and the tariff were left as it is, where would our home market be?

The "nonpartisan" racket is being overworked in behalf of the Wilson administration. First we had the nonpartisan tariff commission project, intended to furnish an alibi for the administration on the Underwood tariff law. Now Ambassador Morgenthau, a partisan adherent of the present administration, is promoting a "nonpartisan" league to promote the candidacy of President Wilson for reelection.

President Wilson professes to be for "America First," yet when Congress had an opportunity to vote on a measure that would insure the establishment and development of dye-stuffs industry in this country and thus make us independent of Germany in that respect, Wilson uttered not one word in its behalf. The Democrats defeated the measure, following the theory of President Wilson that a protective tariff is an economic error, "America First" indeed.

Senator Broussard of Louisiana, is one Democrat who does not hesitate to declare his advocacy of a protective tariff. He gave an interview a few days ago in which he predicted that there will be a revision of the tariff, and along upward lines. He does not pretend to believe that this will be for revenue, merely, but openly admits that it must be for protection purposes. He knows how the Louisiana sugar industry was hit before the war began and has heard from the voters of the state.

1st.—Eighth Street, from the East line of Stillwell Avenue, East to the West line of Block 10 in A. A. Miller's Addition.

2nd.—Fifth Avenue East, from the South side of Third Street to the North side of Eighth Street.

3rd.—Fifth Street, from the center of Sixth Avenue East, East to the East boundary of Tillamook City.

4th.—Fifth Street from the East line of Second Avenue East to the center of Sixth Avenue East, and Third Avenue East from Fourth Street to Fifth Str. et.

The improvement consists in hard surfacing said streets with concrete pavement, with curbs and headers and provisions for surface drainage and sewer for part of project No. 3, in accordance with plans and specifications on file therewith with the City Recorder. Bids for each project numbered to be separate.

All bids must be accompanied by certified check in favor of Tillamook City to the amount of 5 per cent of the bid as a guaranty that the successful bidder will enter into contract with approved bond for the performance thereof.


