**AGRICULTURAL NOTES**  
By R. C. Jones, County Agriculturist.  
Prof. J. E. Larson of O. A. C. sums up his report on the preliminary survey of this district as follows:  
"From the nature of this soil and the condition it is now in, it is safe to say that it will be greatly benefited with only the outlet system installed. The surface water will be quickly removed and the sub-soil will drain out for a considerable distance from the open ditches. However, complete reclamation will depend on additional open ditches or under-drains extending into the various farm fields. When the water is cut off and carried away, that is now coming down from the high lands, much of the trouble now existing on the lower land near the river bank will be remedied. The fact that the streams have poured their waters into the

marsh, with no channel for carrying it away, makes the very bad condition which now exists.  
Summing up, I should say that the land is valuable when it is reclaimed, it is worth very little in its present state and there should be no question in the mind of those who have looked the proposition over as to the feasibility of the proposition, and I hope that it will be readily carried out to a successful completion.  
Every land owner in this district should be present at the meeting of the District called for July 3rd, at Cloverdale, for the purpose of electing a board of supervisors.  
**Enthusiastic Jersey Meeting.**  
Wednesday, June 14th, the Tillamook Jersey Club met at the farm home of Wm. Williams to discuss the progress of the breed in the county and lay plans for its greater development. The afternoon was given

over to a tour of inspection of Mr. Williams' farm and herd of Jerseys. The day was bright and sunny, in fact, it was declared most too hot for Tillamookers to enjoy. All who made the trip down into the pasture, however, felt amply repaid for the time and energy required. The herd was grazing quietly in good feed and with ample shade furnished by the large alder trees scattered here and there. The cows were in pink of condition and spoke remarkably well for their breeding and the care they have had. All but about 8 of the 33 cows on the place are daughters of Maple Park Chief, a bull brought into the county from Hood farm in Massachusetts some eight or nine years ago.  
These daughters drove home the importance of the prepotency of the well bred dairy sire with more force than any speaker could ever do. The uniformity, the great udder develop-

ment, the prominent eyes and other characteristics of heavy producers is remarkably prominent throughout the herd. Any who doubt the value of a few hundred dollars invested in a good bull should make a trip to see these daughters.  
After the tour of inspection, about 75 set down to a sumptuous repast in which Jersey milk and cream featured strongly.  
When all were almost too full for utterance, a business meeting was called at which Morrison Mills, Wm. Maxwell, J. Donaldson, Jas. Murphy and Wm. Williams were elected directors for the coming year. A committee of three was also appointed to look after the interests of the breed at the County Fair and to see that it is well represented there.  
At roll call nearly every one responded with some item of interest in the Jersey world. Appropriate songs

and recitations were given by some of the younger Jersey enthusiasts and Mrs. Williams read a paper on the production of the daughters of Maple Park Chief. Their Cow Testing Association records certainly speak for their breeding even more strongly than their individuality. The County Agriculturist gave a short talk on "Supplementing Pastures with Grain Feeds."  
The day being the National Flag Day, flags and bunting served as decorations. The meeting was closed by everyone singing America. It is believed by all present that the day fittingly commemorated the birth of our National Emblem, and that on this day was also born much added enthusiasm in the Jersey circles of the county.
