Plaintiff now sues the county for \$419.00. *

Hicks over the dispute growing out of the contract for the Sour Grass road. The Tillamook County Court was willing to have the matter settled by appointing persons to estimate the amount owing Hicks, but the Yamhill Court would not agree to this. Attorney H. T. Botts represented Hicks at the meeting and suit will be brought by Hicks to recover what he believes is owing him for the work. *

The Miami Lumber Co. vs. Tillamook County is a suit filed in the circuit court in which the company wants \$2,393.90 damages from the county. The complaint alleges that in the construction of a road, the county made a cut along the side of a hill

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and carelessly and negligently and purposely excavated the dirt from the cut and deposited the same carelessly on the lower side, and rolled out logs, stumps and other debris and allowed same to remain there, which, on the last of February, 1916, caused a slide and the whole thereof was carried over and upon the level portion of land where there were houses and other out buildings; that it will be necessary for the plaintiff to remove the debris and brush, and the County Court having failed to allow the claim for damages this suit was instituted by the plaintiff. *
The Natatorium at Bayocean will be open for the season next Saturday. This is one of the most attractive places in Tillamook, and perhaps the most enjoyed by visitors, for bathing in the Natatorium, with the artificial waves and the water made more congenial than the sea, which is generally cold, is sure to attract large crowds again this year. The Natatorium cost \$75,000, and the tank is 50 feet by 160 feet long. One handicap to this large investment and enterprise is the need of a road to Bayocean, which it is justly entitled to and should have, for none of the seaside resorts have made the improvements that have been made at Bayocean, yet the county have been spending money galore to give them roads, and have seemingly, discriminated against and placed every obstacle in the way of giving Bayocean a square deal and a way out. *

To the Voters of School Dist. No. 9.
In accordance with instructions you gave us at the annual school meeting we investigated the cost of installing a central heating plant for the two school buildings and report as follows: According to figures submitted to us by Mr. Zachman, steam heating engineer and architect F. J. Stranahan, the entire plant will not exceed \$5,500.00 complete and ready for operation. This includes a new steam boiler enclosed in brick, the building including fuel room constructed of corrugated iron and to be 30 by 66 ft. The steam fittings will include new piping in the grade building and of course new piping and radiators in the high school building. The system would be similar to that in the city hall. *
Mr. Zachman states that such a plant will save the district from 25 to 50 per cent in fuel over the present heating plants. Last year to heat both buildings required 140 cords of wood, which cost \$400.00; this year we were able to purchase slabwood for considerable less money, the cost of 140 cords being \$326.00. If 25 per cent were saved this would mean a saving of \$84.00 per year on fuel. There also would be a small saving on insurance, and the janitor labor would be less. *
While the present heating systems in each building is giving satisfactory service and affords all the heat required, we recognize that there are advantages in a central plant, in a probable saving in fuel, labor and insurance, with lessening of risk of fire. If the taxpayers wish to assume the cost of installing the proposed system we think it would be found to give satisfactory service. However, this report is not to be construed as a recommendation either for or against the proposition, but is simply in compliance with the instructions given at the annual meeting. *
We await the further pleasure of the voters of the district in this matter. *
