Dr. Jack Olson returned from Seattle on Monday and was accompanied by Dr. Roy West and wife, of Seattle. Dr. Roy is a professor of dentistry in one of the colleges of that city and will remain in the city for two weeks.

The rain the latter part of last week and the beginning of this week did some damage to the hay in this county, a large quantity being down. As the rain was general over Oregon and Washington, the hay crop is more or less damaged in the Northwest, and on that account it is feared that hay will be high again.

The railroad celebration which will be held at Marshfield and North Bend, August 24th, 25th and 26th, in honor of the completion of the Coos Bay Branch, will be one of the biggest special occasions which has taken place in this state for a good many years. Business Men's special trains will be operated from San Francisco, Portland, Salem and probably one or more trains from Eugene. For this occasion the S. P. will name round trip fares, one and one-third of the usual one-way fare, tickets on sale from points in Oregon August 21st to 26th inclusive, return limit August 31st.

Apportionment of funds for the benefit of county fairs and livestock shows has been made by the secretary of state Olcott, the amount divided among the 35 counties of the state

being \$46,724.75. Under the law a tax of one-twentieth of a mill is levied on the taxable property in the state, and this is divided proportionately among the various counties. Because the law provides that no county shall receive more than \$12,500, and the excess of one-twentieth of a mill on the taxable property in Multnomah County equaled \$4679.33 this latter sum was apportioned among all the counties giving them an additional amount over the sum raised by the levy of \$33.69. The amount apportioned to Tillamook was \$905.99.

C. C. Chapman, of the Oregon Voter, has sent the following resolutions to granges, farmers' unions and commercial bodies:

"Whereas, the wear on Oregon roads is caused principally by automobile traffic, and

"Whereas, the improvement of the through highways is of direct benefit to automobile owners, in saving time and other expense, and

"Whereas, automobile owners as a class are liberally disposed towards road improvement and will endure an increase of auto license fees if the proceeds are to be expended by the state for permanent improvement of through roads, therefore, be it

resolved, that we recommend to the 1917 General Assembly of the State of Oregon the enactment of such legislation as will bring an increased revenue from automobile license fees, same to be the basis for providing interest and sinking-fund payments for bond issues for permanent highway improvement by the state."

Any legislation along this line should insure some of the money raised in this way should be given to each county.

County Court is Unjust to Bayocean.

The County Court, it seems, has decided to take the money that was appropriated for the Bayocean road and to expend it in hardsurfacing roads in other parts of the county, thereby doing Bayocean a great injustice, for if there is any place that is justly entitled to a road and a way out it is Bayocean. It is no secret that some of the timber men opposed the building of this road, and are doing so today, but there is a strong sentiment in the county in favor of giving Bayocean a road, and it would have received it if Judge Gatens allowed the receiver for the Potter Realty Co. to go ahead with the proposition he made at the budget meeting. The Court appears to be somewhat divided. County Judge A. M. Hare and Commissioner F. L. Owens want to expend all of it on hard surfacing, while Commissioner G. R. McKimins is opposed to this, and when he ascertained what the county judge and the other commissioners decided to do he filed a protest and asked to have it go on the court journal. Mr. McKimins appeared to be in favor of giving Bayocean \$10,000 of the money appropriated, but he has changed his mind and is willing to take \$5,000.00 and expend it on this end of the road, which will be permanent work. This is how McKimins will go on record:

"I am opposed to taking the full amount of \$15,000 appropriated for building a part of the Bayocean road and using it for hard surface roads, but in favor of using at least \$5,000 of the appropriation on the Bayocean road, commencing on the end of the Sandberg contract, which will be permanent work."

There is every probability that the County Court will be enjoined from diverting the money appropriated for Bayocean.

A petition is being circulated amongst the dairymen of South Prairie to have the \$15,000 appropriated for the Bayocean road used for hard surfacing in that vicinity.

City Surveyor Resigns.

City Engineer Ross Shreve handed in his resignation Tuesday to take effect at once. This action of the city engineer resulted from the appointment, by the city council, of Councilman David O'Donnell of the first ward as inspector of concrete pavements now under construction by the city.

Shreve, who had charge of the work, appointed an inspector who claimed to be experienced in concrete work, at a salary of \$75.00 per month. This appointment did not meet with the approval of the city dads, and at the meeting Monday night the inspector was removed and O'Donnell appointed in his place at \$40.00 per day. In his communication to the council Shreve says that O'Donnell is inexperienced in this work, and wholly incompetent to act as inspector.

Mayor Brodhead called a special session of the council Wednesday and Shreve's resignation was accepted and Harry P. Kerr was given the position of city engineer. O'Donnell was retained as inspector, although the council was advised by the city attorney that such action was contrary to the city charter which provides that "No officer of the corporation shall be interested in any contract, or work, the expenses of which are to be paid out of the city treasury."

A petition is being circulated by the property owners effected by this improvement, protesting against O'Donnell's appointment.
