

BAYOCEAN ROAD AGAIN.

Lot Owners Confer with Commercial Club and County Court.

The Bayocean road problem cropped up again, when a number of lot owners of Bayocean, residing in Portland asked the privilege of a meeting with the Tillamook Commercial Club and the County Court, and a meeting was arranged for last Saturday evening at the club rooms, when a delegation came in from Portland to discuss the road question.

The president of the club, Fred C. Baker, stated the purpose of the meeting and called upon Attorney L. E. Latourette, who made a strong plea that the money appropriated for the road to Bayocean be used for that purpose, and he asked the assistance of the Commercial Club in this matter. He submitted a petition, signed by over 50 lot owners who reside in Portland, stating their case, which was as follows:

To the Honorable County Judge and Commissioners of Tillamook, Oregon:

Gentlemen—The undersigned petitioners respectfully show:

That they are the purchasers and owners of property in Bayocean, Oceanview and Long Beach.

That, with the exception of Netarts which has long had a wagon road, these places constitute the nearest ocean beach to the County Seat of Tillamook County, but cannot be reached by any wagon road and are inconvenient of access.

That this beach resort is the only one in Tillamook County which has not been provided with a wagon road and the growth of this beach has been greatly retarded from lack of such road.

That the building of such road will be influential in obtaining for Tillamook City railroad terminal rates equal to those enjoyed by Seaside, Gearhart and other resorts and will help to bring to Tillamook County its proper share of tourist travel.

That the want of such road to this beach has been a serious drawback to the building of homes and summer cottages and has thus prevented many people from Tillamook County, because of the inconveniences and difficulties of getting building material to this beach.

That the building of such road will be of great benefit, not only to the owners of property along the beach, but also to the merchants of Tillamook City, business men and farmers of the county, because of creating a better local market for dairy, garden and farm products.

Wherefore, we, the undersigned, respectfully petition and pray that the amount set aside in the budget for this road be not diverted to any other purpose but be applied to building this road, and that the County Court proceed as soon as practicable to advertise for bids and award a contract for the building of this road or so much thereof as the funds available will permit, and that provision be made in next year's budget for sufficient funds to complete such road to the east line of the Bayocean plat, and we pledge our influence with those in control of the Bayocean property to extend such road to the ocean, and connect with the paved streets.

F. D. Mitchell also made a strong plea for a road to Bayocean, as did J. C. Soderberg, H. A. Ruble, T. H. Short, A. C. Show, Clarence R. Wagner and Geo. Higgins.

The members of the club who strongly urged the building of the road to Bayocean with the money appropriated in the last budget were Attorney H. T. Botts, C. J. Edwards, C. L. Cough, D. L. Shrode, F. R. Beals, R. W. Watson and others.

County Judge A. M. Hare stated that, without a road, the property owners of Bayocean, who payed between \$7,000 and \$8,000 annually in taxes, should be reduced one half. He was satisfied that Bayocean should have a road, from a moral standpoint, but there was a legal phase that he was not able to decide. Commissioner McKimens was in favor of giving Bayocean a road.

John Dougal who represents part of the timber owners, raised an objection to spending the \$15,000 on the Bayocean road and wanted it expended on hard surfacing. A discussion then took place as to the action of the budget meeting in voting that if the Potter Realty Co. did not come through with their offer to complete the road for \$15,000 the whole amount should be expended in hard surfacing. It was stated that work on the Bayocean road had been stopped on account of the rock used for rip-rapping going to pieces as soon as it came in contact with the air. Notwithstanding that the meeting was called for the purpose of discussing the Bayocean road, Mr. Dougal did not have the good manners to confine himself to that subject, but tooted his own horn as to what he had done in this and other counties. As he seemed to impress it upon the meeting that he represented all the timber men, the president called the attention of the meeting to the fact that some of the other large timber owners were opposed to having the money used for hard surfacing and wanted it expended on the Bayocean road. Every person present, with the exception of Mr. Dougal, who is not a taxpayer and does not contribute a cent himself to road and other improvements in the county, were in favor of expending the money appropriated on the Bayocean road.

These were the resolutions passed at the meeting:

"Resolved, that the Tillamook Commercial Club endorse the petition proposed by the Bayocean Lot Buyers' Protective Association for presentation to the County Court of Tillamook County in reference to the Bayocean road adopted July 8th, 1916."

"Resolved, that it is the sense of this meeting of the Tillamook Commercial Club, with the representatives of the Bayocean Lot Buyers' Protective Association, held in Tillamook, Oregon, July 8th, 1916, that the

county court should procure the services of a thoroughly competent engineer to determine the proper location of the proposed Bayocean road before said road is undertaken so that it may be assured that money spent in construction of the road shall not be wasted."

County Surveyor Jackson made the survey of the road and prepared estimates of cost, which was \$47,563, but when Mr. Hobson became road master and when part of the road had been constructed he changed the survey so that the rocky points could be avoided by dredging and his estimate to complete the road was \$29,965.

PREPAREDNESS IN TILLAMOOK.

Battery Coast Artillery Organized in this City.

It was through the efforts of Attorney S. S. Johnson, who saw service in the Spanish war, Ray B. Walls and others that a battery of Coast Artillery was organized in this city on Tuesday morning. A meeting for that purpose was called for Monday evening at the city hall, which was well attended by young men, but owing to insufficient names and a few dropping out, the list lacked about a dozen names. Lieutenant Willis Shippam, of the Coast Artillery came in from Portland to make the organization, and he addressed the meeting and explained several matters pertaining to the duties of the members of a battery. Several towns of large population had asked permission to form a battery but Acting Adjutant General Wilson preferred Tillamook, on account of geographical location and most suited for a battery of artillery.

Quite a little enthusiasm occurred in obtaining names, but a number of young men did not quite understand what was required of them and held back for a time. Those who were interested in forming the battery hustled up sufficient names early Tuesday morning, and when the adjournment meeting was called to order at nine o'clock, the organization was completed. The election of officers was deferred until August, when Lieutenant Shippam will return and the uniforms and other accoutrements will be on hand.

Attorney Johnson announced that the first drill will take place next Friday evening, the battery to meet at the City Hall at 7:30.
