BAYOCEAN ROAD AGAIN.

Lot Owners Confer with Commercial Club and County Court.

The Bayocean road problem cropped up again,, when a number of lot owners of Bayocean, residing in Portland asked the privilege of a meeting with the Tillamook Commercial Club and the County Court, and a meeting was arranged for last Saturday even-ing at the club rooms, when a delega-tion came in from Portland to discuss

the road question.

The president of the club, Fred C.
Baker, stated the purpose of the
meeting and called upon Attorney L. E. Latourette, who made a strong plea that the money appropriated for the road to Bayocean be used for that purpose, and he asked the assistance of the Commercial Club in this matter. He submitted a petition signed by over 50 lot owners who re side in Portland, stating their case

That the building of such road will be influential in obtaining for Tilla-mook City railroad terminal rates equal to those enjoyed by Seaside, Gearhart and other resorts and will help to bring to Tillamook County its

proper share of tourist travel.

That the want of such road to this beach has been a serious drawback to the building of homes and summer cottages and has thus prevented many people from Tillamook County, because of the inconveniences and diffi-culties of getting building material

That the building of such road will be of great benefit, not only to the owners of property along the beach, but also to the merchants of Tillamook City, business men and farmers of the county, because of creating a better local market for dairy, garden and farm products.

ed that, without a road, the property owners of Bayocean, who payed between \$7,000 and \$8,000 annually in taxes, should be reduced one half. He was satisfied that Bayocean should have a road, from a moral standpoint, but there was a legal phase that he was not able to decide. Commissioner McKimens was in favor of giving Bayocean a road.

John Dougal who represents part of the timber owners, raised an objec-tion to spending the \$15,000 on the Bayocean road and wanted it expend-ed on hard surfacing. A discussion then took place as to the action of the budget meeting in voting that if the Potter Realty Co. did not come through with their offer to complete the road for \$15,000 the whole amount should be expended in hard surfacing. It was stated that work on surfacing. It was stated that work on the Bayocean road had been stopped on account of the rock used for ripraping going to pieces as soon as it came in contact with the air. Notwithstanding that the meeting was called for the purpose of discussing the Bayocean road, Mr. Dougal did not have the good manners to confine himself to that subject, but tooted his own horn as to what he had done in this and other counties. As he seemed to impress it upon the meeting that he represented all the timber men, the president called the attention of the meeting to the fact that some of the other large timber owners were opposed to having the mon-ey used for hard surfacing and wanted it expended on the Bayocean road Every person present, with the ex-ception of Mr. Dougal, who is not a taxpayer and does not contribute a cent himself to road and other improvements in the county, were in favor of expending the money appro-priated on the Bayocean road.

These were the resolutions passed at the meeting:

county court should procure the services of a thoroughly competent en-gineer to determine the proper loca-tion of the proposed Bayocean road before said road is undertaken so that it may be assured that money spent in construction of the road shall not be wasted."

County Surveyor Jackson made the survey of the goad and prepared es-timates of cost, which was \$47,563, but when Mr. Hobson became road master and when part of the road had been constructed he changed the survey so that the rocky points could be avoided by dredging and his estimate to complete the road was \$29,965.
