Editorial Snap Shots.

It depends greatly upon circumstances. The dairymen who pasture all his meadows looked upon the rain Saturday and Sunday as a blessing, but the dairyman with his hay getting soaked looked upon the rain as a calamity.

If the County Court is such a "sticker on budgets, why didn't it 'stick' when it appropriated, and the taxpayers approved of a \$10,000 bridge at Woods? Those poor farmers in that part of the county, for whose benefit the bridge was to be built, got it in the neck, badly, didn't they?

The snap shot man is in hope that someone will file proceedings to restrain the county court from expending the money elsewhere that is appropriated for the Bayocean road, for it is a rank injustice to Bayocean to do so as well as short sightedness. The slogan is "Give Bayocean a square deal."

If Bayocean cannot get a square deal and is discriminated against to the extent that road money appropriated for that place is diverted to other places, let's have a rousing indignation meeting in this city. Just to show that there are a large number of persons who do not believe in injustice to Bayocean.

Because some few persons at the budget meeting were unjust by placing a "string" on the appropriation for the Bayocean road it is no reason that the County Court should be unjust also, for it is fully advised and honestly satisfied that Bayocean is entitled to a road. What's the trouble, anyway, and why can't Bayocean have what it is justly entitled to?

Some of the large timber owners want the money appropriated for Bayocean road spent there and not diverted to other purposes, because, they claim, that if that is done it will make that much more money to raise in the next budget. The snap shot man is of the opinion that it does not show good horse sense on the part of the timber men, who are complaining about heavy taxation, to favor something that will increase taxation.

Over in Lincoln County good dairy land is offered at from \$35.00 to \$40.00 per acre, the same kind of land that is held in Tillamook County at \$300.00 to \$400.00 per acre. Some day, and it is not far distant, when the inflated valuations in dairy lands in this county will take a tremendous drop, and then the assessments will take a drop also, as well as the taxes that the dairymen are paying on inflated valuations.

The snap shot man does not want to scrap the County Court on account of the Bayocean road, for the reason we realize that the members of the court are holding down unthankful jobs and are often unjustly criticized. But as the snap shot man is firmly of the opinion that Bayocean should have a road, he is going to scrap anything such time Bayocean gets what it is justly entitled to no matter who we offend or who we please. So when the snap shot man takes the part of the under dog, and hurls some hot shots at the county court, we want it distinctly understood that this is a public matter that concerns the development of the county and not a personal matter on our part. We believe we have justice and right on our side and there is injustice on the part of the County Court. The snap shot man has never failed to win a fight with these conditions at the back of him.

High finance in Tillamook. If the money appropriated for the Bayocean road is used for other purposes it will mean that the taxes for Bayocean will have to be reduced one half, and it will be a loss to the county of about \$3,500. A little over one mile of concrete road can be constructed with the \$15,000 appropriated for the Bayocean road, and with the loss of \$3,500, in taxes, it means that a little over a mile of hard surfaced road will cost \$18,500. And at a time when people are complaining about high taxation and county money being wasted. If this is not high finance what in the name of thunder is it? And why can't Fairview and other parts of the county circulate petitions and join the greedy, selfish movement of depriving Bayocean of a road and have the money expended in their localities, for it is all fair in love, war, politics and grabbing road money that does not rightly belong to them?

The last straw breaks the camel's back. As Bayocean cannot get justice and the money appropriated for the purpose of giving that place a road is to be used in hardsurfacing other parts of the county, lets all get into the bonding band wagon and obtain between 30 and 40 miles of it. Now, whoop, he rup boys, whoop her up Fairview should have and needs two miles more of hard surface pavement. There should be a hard surface road between this city and Bay City. The

north part of the county needs some hard surfaced roads, for it is not fair to confine the hard surfacing to the central part of the county. The South part of the county, which is dependent on county roads for travel, should have hard surfaced roads, and a hard surfaced road from Cloverdale to Tillamook will receive the almost unanimous support of the people in the south part of the county. A big pile of money is going out every year to maintain the highway through this county, so why not stop this and hardsurface them? It can be done by bonding. And then, probable Bayocean will be given a square deal.

Unfortunately, the dairymen of this county, who are dependent upon feed that is shipped into the county, were hard hit last year, and it is safe to predict that they will be again, for the recent rains damaged considerable hay in the Willamette Valley. As these conditions are liable to occur quite often, it is just as well to adopt the popular phrase—"Preparedness"—and do something to relieve the situation in the future. This can be done if everybody will look the matter squarely in the face and act accordingly. Too much money have gone out of the county in the past for excessive charges for feed, owing to having no direct transportation service with California markets. It is not only to the interest of the dairymen who should obtain cheap feed, but it is to the interest of everybody in the county that a line of steamers or lumber schooners be operated between here and California ports. The only obstacle in the way is the need of a deeper channel between this city and the bay, which can be obtained at a comparatively small outlay—a few thousand dollars for the next few years. Considering the benefits and the large amount of money the dairymen and business men would save every year in freight charges, the expenditure amounts to little or nothing. This is an opportune time for those who are interested in dairying and business to get together and agree upon some plan to bring about what we have advocated. Both have been hard hit in the past and it is just as well to do something to overcome the difficulty of obtaining cheaper feed in the future, for the high price of feed the past eighteen months have about busted some of our dairymen who paid high prices for their land. The same conditions are going to prevail the coming winter, with feed probably a little higher. Any and every effort that is made to establish a line of steamers or lumber schooners between here and California markets should meet with the united support of everybody, for it will mean a great saving in freight rates and will be of inestimable value to the dairymen in obtaining cheaper feed.

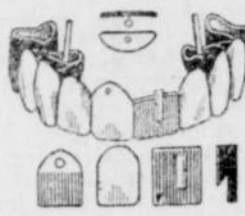
