C. S. Starr, who represents some of the large timber owners in this county, was in the city this week. He stated that the timbermen whom he represented were in favor of the County Court expending the \$15,000 appropriated for the Bayocean road being expended there and not diverted and used for other purposes. \*  
John Theiler, appellant vs. Tillamook County, action for damages; opinion by Justice Benson; Circuit Judge Bagley's judgment for defendant affirmed. This was a case where Theiler sued the county for damages on account of road work opposite his farm which was decided against him in the circuit court. \*  
E. J. Dann vs. D. J. Dunn is a divorce suit filed in the circuit court. These parties were married in Tillamook county in the year 1882 and eight children have been born to the union, five of whom are of age. The complaint alleges cruel and inhuman treatment towards the plaintiff, who suffered many personal indignities, making her life burdensome. \*  
Captain Curtis B. Winn, of the Oregon Militia, has been in the city for a few days endeavoring to get a number of young men to join the militia, who are to take the place of the married men who were sent to the Mexican border with the Oregon boys. Eight young men volunteered their services, viz., Don Simmons, Marion Bowman, Charles D. Fay, H. D. Gabriel, Earl Schultson, Robert O. Thomas and Arthur Wallace. They left this morning for Camp Withycombe with Captain Winn, with

the exception of Wallace who will leave in a few days. \*  
Miss Kathleen Mills, deputy county clerk, met with an accident on Sunday evening at Fairview. She was about to leave her home to attend the Chautauqua, and in coming down the stairs she slipped, and reaching out her left arm to save herself, it was broken at the wrist. Dr. Boals was sent for and set the broken arm. She was able to be at work this morning. \*  
A survey is being run up Kilchis river by the Whitney Co., for the purpose of putting in a logging road. The Whitney Co. have a large amount of timber in that vicinity, and is now making arrangements to have it logged and manufactured. The company bought the C. A. Johnson place at Garibaldi, and it is rumored that a large saw mill will be erected there, but when this will be constructed and the logging road built is not known. \*  
Tillamook Company to be Organized August 5th. \*  
Attorney S. S. Johnson, who was instrumental in creating the interest in forming a company of the Oregon Militia in Tillamook, has received a letter from the Acting Adjutant General Wilson stating that the company will be organized on August 5th. This is the letter Mr. Johnson received, which is of interest to the young men who have joined the company as well as others who wish success to the first company of State Militia organized in Tillamook. \*

Dear Mr. Johnson—Lieutenant Shippam, on returning to this office from your city, was so enthusiastic in regard to forming an organization of Coast Artillery in your city that I see fit at this time to instruct you that your company will be mustered in at 8 o'clock, p.m., August 5, 1916. You can feel assured that there will be no further delay and you can go ahead with your work with the understanding that this company will, without doubt, be mustered in on the date mentioned. \*  
Enlistment papers, physical examination blanks, etc. are being forwarded you. However, I would suggest that you do not try to make out these papers until the arrival of the mustering officer in order to avoid mistakes. **"Home Town Preparedness."**

The above subject was discussed at the Chautauqua last week by Ernest J. Sias, who is a booster of community interest and the home town. Mr. Sias' lecture was attentively listened to and quite frequently applauded, even if he was a little outspoken in his remarks. \*  
Mr. Sias took up the subject of Commercial Clubs and Women's Civic Improvement Leagues and spoke highly of them as community builders. He said that every business man, professional men and clerks and mechanics should belong to a commercial club, who should get together for the improvement of the home town, for it needed everybody to get behind a club and push it along, he believed with that kind of co-operation Tillamook City could be made a town of 40,000 inhabitants in about 18 years. Mr. Sias commended the citizens for the fine school buildings, educational advantages, the fine paved streets, and concrete sidewalks, the new city hall and new business blocks, but he stated that there were many things that could and should be done here to improve the city. He had gone over the city and said that if they did not cut the grass in some places it would crowd pedestrians off the sidewalks. "Pull down those old fences and old shacks, and pull up those old rotten sidewalks," was one argument he advanced to improve the appearance of the city, and with every body assisting the Commercial Club and the Women's Civic Improvement League this could be accomplished. He severely criticised the business man and the others who would not join in the community movement. This city should have the community spirit and everybody should be loyal and patriotic to their home town and community. Talk about your home town whenever you have an opportunity, and tell visitors of the progress it is making, and the big town it will be in the near future. He believed that good roads were the best asset to a city and a farming community, and the farmers and the business men should pull together and work together so as to create a more friendly community spirit. \*  
Part of Mr. Sias' lecture dealt with mail order houses, and he stated that this method of trading was crowding out the country store and taking away business from the smaller towns. This he thought was a serious state of affairs, and it could not exist if people would be loyal to their home business houses and home communities. He strongly urged his audience to support the home merchants and the business men to trade with one another. The mail order houses did not contribute one cent toward taxes or to improve community interests, and it appeared to him that this method of trading was patronizing mail order houses, instead of enhancing the value of property, were doing the opposite. No one ever heard of anybody sending their children to a mail order house to be educated, or when a person was taken sick to be sent to a mail order house to be cured. "If

you people would get the right community spirit, and back up your Commercial Club and Women's Civic Improvement League, and support your home merchants and industries, why, you would be surprised yourselves what you could accomplish," and added to this he recommended that everybody "Get the Tillamook Spirit."

**Tillamook Day at the Fair.**

At a meeting of the Executive Board of the Tillamook Commercial Club at the Club rooms on Wednesday evening, the matter of the business men taking part in the opening day of the County Fair was up for consideration. It was decided to cooperate with the Fair Board on the opening afternoon, the business men to form a parade and march to the fair grounds dressed in white duck pants, white shirts and white caps. Governor Withycombe has been invited to take part and make a speech on the opening day. Erwin Harrison, secretary of the Fair Board, was present and asked the Commercial Club to take this matter in hand, as the opening day is Tillamook day. President Baker was authorized to appoint a committee to call upon the business men and induce all of them to take part. In previous years there have been no formal opening of the fair, and this year it will be one of the features, as will the parade by the Women's Civic Improvement League, which is making elaborate preparations. The president was also instructed to appoint a committee to procure a suitable site for a camp ground for automobiles, which other cities are doing for the convenience of tourists.

**Fair Board Meets.**

The Fair Board met on Friday at the Fair Grounds, with L. M. Krancer, president; Erwin Harrison, secretary; and D. L. Thompson, present.

It was decided to clear a race track of a quarter of a mile for foot and pony races.

The Board accepted the offer of the Cloverdale Band to furnish music for the fair.

C. E. Reynolds made a proposition to the board and asked that \$450.00 be appropriated for a dancing pavilion on the grounds, on the understanding that the first \$50.00 taken in for dancing should go to Mr. Reynolds and the remainder divided with the board. Messrs. Krancer and Thompson voted for and Mr. Harrison against.

The secretary was instructed to ask for bids for whitewashing the buildings and sheds.

Rule 10 a was amended that all premiums are liable to reduction in case of an emergency caused by bad weather or if the gate receipts fall below the amount of money required. The board engaged Chester McGhee's orchestra.

**Tax the Auto for Road Work.**

The snap shot man is in hearty accord with the movement to tax automobiles and use all the money for road work. Since automobiles and motor trucks cut up and destroy the macadam roads, and have done far more damage to them than farmer's wagons, it is only right and proper that those who own autos and travel the roads should pay something substantial towards their upkeep. We believe every auto should be taxed \$50 and every auto truck \$100. And the next state legislature should pass a law to that effect and each county should have a fair proportion of the tax collected from autos.

**Witepski's Royal Hungarian Orchestra at the Chautauqua.**

The most enjoyable musical feature of the Chautauqua last week was Witepski's Royal Hungarian Orchestra, this being its second appearance in this city. The orchestra was given another warm, appreciative reception by the people of Tillamook, who appeared delighted that Mandel Witepski was on the Chautauqua program this year. This splendid company of musicians under the able direction of Mr. Witepski rendered some beautiful music, which proved the best and was more appreciated than other musical numbers on the program. One valuable addition to the orchestra was Madame Fay Morvilius, mezzo contralto, whose great personal charm, winsome attractiveness and charming vocal solos captivated the audience, the repeated encores proving how delighted the people of Tillamook were with the part she took in the program and the rendering of national airs, which brought everybody to their feet. Madame Fay Morvilius was by far the most accomplished vocal soloist in this year's Chautauqua.

**Sued for \$15,000 Damages.**

A damage suit was filed in the Circuit Court on Wednesday for \$15,000, in which A. T. Dolan claims that T. J. Harris damaged him to that amount of money. The complaint states that Tillamook City advertised for bids for certain street improvements, and that plaintiff and defendant entered into an agreement to put in a bid for this work, which they did but the bid of the Arenz Construction Company being the lowest, it was awarded the contract, and the complaint alleges that the defendant in the presence of a number of persons, wantonly, wilfully and orally make and utter false statements about the plaintiff, accusing him of selling out to the Arenz Construction Co. by falsely deceiving the defendant as to the amount which the plaintiff and defendant should have bid for the construction of the work; that the plaintiff was a crook and deceived the defendant while he was his partner and acting in collusion with the Arenz Construction Co., that the plaintiff had dealt crookedly with the defendant in making a bid that he knew would not be accepted; that plaintiff had changed and deceived the defendant as to the bid; that plaintiff had corruptly and wickedly conspired with the Arenz Construction Co., the defendant making the remark in the presence of a number of persons: "How much do you suppose he (meaning the plaintiff) received from the Arenz Construction Co. to sell out?"
