Captain Charles Miller, of the Cape Meares light station, was in the city on Wednesday. He is considerable of a booster for the Bayocean road and thinks it is a shame that the county court is delaying the building of the road. He says that the number of persons who visit the light station is increasing every year, and 1,500 or more will have visited it this year.

The Commercial Club received a communication from the Astoria Regatta committee asking us to send a Maid of Honor to serve in the Court of the Queen of the Regatta, also inviting our members to attend. This is their 21st Annual Regatta and the committee says it will be the greatest regatta ever staged. Word being received so late, does not give us time to elect a Maid of Honor and get her ready for the occasion.

Secretary of the Commercial Club was completely surprised one day this week. A young business man walked into his office and asked: "What is the commercial club doing now? When do they meet? What are the dues? What are the requirements to become a member?" After Secretary Smith answered the rash of questions, the party produced a check for the necessary amount and said "I want to become a member of your club and assist every way possible." The party was no other than Leslie Harrison, and he should be presented with a medal, for acts of this sort are rare in Tillamook.

Ruth Hylton vs. H. T. Hylton is a divorce suit filed in the circuit court. These parties were married in Tillamook the 21st of July 1912, and two children have been born to the union. Cruel and inhuman treatment is the ground upon which the divorce is sought, the plaintiff alleging that the defendant neglected and refused to provide proper support and accused her wrongly and falsely of being untrue to her marriage vows; and that defendant contracted a large number of bills which he was unable to pay, which greatly humiliated the plaintiff. The plaintiff asks also for the custody of the two children and \$20.00 per month for their support.

F. H. Neilson vs. Andrew Zurcher and Jacob Tabman is a suit filed in the circuit court to quiet title to certain property over which there is a dispute. The plaintiff prays that the defendants set forth their pretended and claimed interest; that said claim be adjudged null and void and that the plaintiff is the owner in fee simple; that the court establish the boundary line between the lands; that the deed executed by defendant Zurcher be reformed; that an accounting be had of the rents; that plaintiff be given judgment against the defendants for the amounts so ascertained; and that the plaintiffs title in and to the said lands be forever quieted.

E. M. Condit and wife and Dr. Reedy and wife, in one car and W. J. Riechers and wife, Mrs. Pique and Miss Cleo Budd, in another car, made a trip Sunday over the new road to Seaside. They left this city at 6 a. m. and reached Seaside at 9:30. Returning they left Seaside at 5 p. m. and reached home at 9:30, stopping on the road for supper. They report the roads good with the exception of about two miles, which is being fixed. When they arrived at Seaside people were surprised they had come through from Tillamook. There were thousands of persons and hundreds of autos there, and this gave the Tillamookers some idea what the beach business amounts to. The only perceptible grade on the whole road from this city to Seaside was the hill at Hobsonville.

Tillamook Hotel Loses Cases.

Mrs. S. W. Kapishka vs. Tillamook Hotel Co., which was appealed from the justice court, in which the plaintiff sued and obtained judgment against the hotel company for \$28.00 for services rendered while the hotel was in the hands of a receiver, Judge H. H. Belt handed down a decision confirming the decision of the lower court with costs.

John Leland Henderson vs. Tillamook Hotel Company, P. J. Worrall, Anna Worrall and Charles Kunze, which was a case to recover expenses incurred by A. H. Gaylord while receiver, and which was tried before Judge Belt last May, was decided in favor of the plaintiff and it was ordered that the receiver pay to the hotel company the sum of \$422.00; that the hotel company thereupon transfer and assign to Gaylord all its claim and interest on the claim now shown upon its books against E. F. Heliere for \$133.00 on account of draft cashed by the receiver; that the receiver recover of and from the plaintiff for his services as receiver the sum of \$455.00, the further sum of \$79.00 for his services in keeping accounts of the receipts and disbursements of the company prior to his being appointed receiver, the further sum of \$289.00 on account of said Gaylord and Carlton as expert accountants, the further sum of \$32.15 for premium on bond, labor and expert accountant and for publication of notice of hearing final report, and that this shall be a full, final and complete settlement of all matters connected with the receivership.
