Obituary.

Max Herbert Doerge, was born in Minneapolis, Minn., Dec. 28, 1894. He was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Doerge. His mother died at Stillwater, Minn., when he was but nine years old.

He came to Tillamook, Oregon in 1910 and had lived here until April 1916 when he went to Washington. He was killed while at work in the Saginaw Logging Camp No. 4, near Aberdeen, Wash., Wednesday morning, Aug. 16, 1916, at the age of 21 years, 7 months and 19 days.

He was a talented young musician, being a member of both the Tillamook and Aberdeen Bands in which he was solo cornetist. He was also a member of the Christian Church orchestra at Tillamook.

Report of Scales in Tillamook.

In answer to complaints, J. F. Jones District Sealer of Weights and Measures for the Western District recently came into Tillamook County for the purpose of checking the scales and his report to Fred G. Buchtel, State Sealer, shows the following conditions.

Eight scales in use in the Creamery and Cheese factories were condemned for repairs, and 55 weights were found to be light 1.8 to 1.4 ounces, most of these being counterpoise weights where the error multiplies one or two hundred times. Actually all of these weights were adjusted so as to conform with standard. Such as could not be made standard were condemned permanently.

One scale was discovered in use, the weights of which had been drilled out so that the scale would at all times weigh light when used with such weights. In one instance weights were being used upon a scale different from the one for which they were made, with the result that articles weighed were light. 18 scales were permanently condemned, 25 were adjusted and corrected, and a total of 125 scales were sealed as correct.

In addition to the work done upon the scales in this community, complaints regarding the measurement of wool were investigated and the measurements adjusted to the satisfaction of the parties concerned. There was a total of approximately 600 inspections.

This was the first complete inspection made in Tillamook County, and the people whose scales were inspected generally expressed their pleasure and satisfaction in having a District Sealer visit them.
