1910 and had lived here until April 1916 when he went to Washington. He was killed while at work in the Saginaw Logging Camp No. 4, near Aberdeen, Wash., Wednesday morn-ing, Aug. 16, 1916, at the age of 21 years, 7 months and 19 days.

He was a talanted young musician, being a member of both the Tilla-mook and Aberdeen Bands in which ne was solo cornetist. He was also a member of the Christian Church orchestra at Tillamook.

He was a highly respected young man and will be greatly missed by all who knew him.

He leaves his father, sister, two brothers and a host of friends to nourn him.
