They have been taking their vacation hiking, having talked from Eugene to Florence and then to Newport and through the Siletz reservation to Cloverdale, and from there autoed to this city.

If the strike order goes into effect on Monday, the A. F. Coats Lumber Co.'s saw mill in this city will close down until the strike is settled. The strike will also interfere with the cheese industry, with the exception of the cheese supplied to Portland and California, and the tie up, should it come, will mean a large amount of cheese kept here that cannot reach the usual markets.

E. F. Richards, formerly of Provo, Utah, and for the last three years living near Cloverdale, died on Tuesday last week and the remains were brought to this city and buried Thursday, the W. O. W. taking charge of the funeral, the deceased being a member of Provo Camp, No. 482. Deceased was in poor health when he came to Tillamook, and the cause of death was paralysis. He was about 60 years of age and his wife and one son Arthur, were here with him. The other sons were Harry and Edward, of Provo, Utah, and Alfred, of Gold Hill, Colo. The deceased was a man who was well liked since his residence here.

Judge Bagley rendered a decree in the case of Arthur M. Churchill vs. Minnie A. Mead and T. B. Mead in favor of the plaintiff, who is to receive \$16,875.00 and interest etc. The court finds that the defendants executed a mortgage dated February 10th, 1915; that F. R. Beals, the mortgagee herein, on the 13th day of October, 1915, duly assigned and transferred the mortgage to plaintiff; that at the time of the institution of the suit plaintiff was the owner and holder; and that the defendants have failed to comply with the conditions of the mortgage. H. T. Botts was attorney for plaintiff and S. S. Johnson for defendants, who have given notice of appeal to the supreme court.

ADVISORY COUNCIL.

Tillamook County Agricultural Council Formed on Wednesday.

On Wednesday afternoon a meeting was called at the court house for the purpose of forming a Tillamook County Agricultural Council, the purpose of which is to act as an advisory board to the County Agriculturist.

Paul V. Meris, State Leader of County Agent Work, of the O. A. C. and L. R. Simons, of the Agricultural Department, Washington, D. C. were present and explained the workings of the council and what was expected of it.

After reading the by-laws, which were five below, Charles Kunze was elected temporary chairman and Roy Jones secretary.

Mr. Kunze was nominated and elected president, and although he felt reluctant to undertake the responsibility, would do so if the members of the council would do their part, for it was up to them to make it a success.

A. W. Bunn was elected vice-president and James Williams secretary-treasurer.

The council is composed of the following members:

S. G. Reed, representing the north part of the county; C. A. Swenson, the center part of the county and A. W. Bunn, representing the south part of the county, members at large.

Cloverdale Grange, several Farmers' Unions, the Commercial Club and the County Court will have representatives on the Council, who will be named at the next meeting of these organizations.

Article I.—Name.

The name of this organization shall be the Tillamook County Agricultural Council.

Article II.—Purpose.

It shall be the purpose of this Council to co-operate with the Oregon Agricultural College and the United States Department of Agriculture in outlining the work and maintaining the office of the County Agricultural Agent, and in general, to promote the agricultural welfare of the county.

Article III.—Membership.

The membership of the Council shall consist of the following:

One representative from each of the agricultural organizations of the county, (such as granges, farmers' unions, growers' associations, breeders' associations, improvement clubs, commercial clubs, etc.) which shall be elected by the organization to the Council, indicate its desire to co-operate for the above stated purpose; one member of the board of county commissioners, appointed by that body; three members at large, representing the unorganized farmers of the county and appointed by the board of county commissioners from a list of six farmers nominated by the County Agricultural Agent.

Article IV.—Terms of Office.

After the organization of the Council the members shall draw lots and those receiving even numbers shall hold office for two years and those receiving odd numbers shall hold office for one year, but after the first year all members of the council shall hold office for two years and the term of half the council shall expire each year. The secretary shall draw lots for absent members and notify them as to whether their first selection is for one year or two years. Vacancies on the council may be filled at any time in the same manner in which the retiring representative received his election.

Article V.—Officers.

The officers of the Council shall consist of a president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer, elected by ballot for one year or until successor is duly elected at the regular annual meeting. The duties shall be those usually assigned to such officers.

Article VI.—Executive Committee.

The above named officers of the Council and two additional members appointed by the president from the Council at large, shall constitute an executive committee which shall have authority to transact such business as the Council may direct and which shall hold office for one year or until successors are elected and appointed.

Article VII.—Additional Committees.

The president of the Council shall appoint from the Council at large, a committee of one for each of the projects which the County Agricultural Agent may have upon his program of work and may appoint additional committees as the need may develop. The president of the Council and the County Agricultural Agent shall be ex-officio members of each committee.

Article VIII.—Meetings.

The meetings of the Council, with the exception of the annual meeting, shall be held at the call of the president and the president shall be required to call a meeting upon a request signed by five members of the Council.

An annual meeting of the Council shall be held on a day in December fixed by the executive committee and at least one month prior to the date of the annual meeting, the secretary shall send or cause to have sent to each of the farmers' organizations of the county an announcement of the annual meeting and shall request those whose representative retires from the Council, to elect a successor for the ensuing two years, who shall be present at the annual meeting and participate in the annual election of officers.

Article IX.—Reports to Organizations.

It shall be the duty of each member of the Agricultural Council to report to the organization which he represents, at its regular meetings, regarding the progress of the work being carried on by the Council through the Agricultural Agent and otherwise.

Article XI.—Quorum.

One-third or more members of the Council shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article XII.—Amendments.

This constitution and by-laws may be amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular meeting at which a quorum is present.
