**Editorial Snap Shots.**

Quite a number of our leading citizens are wondering whether the County Court is going to deprive Bayocean of the money it appropriated for that road in the last budget.

The parade Friday, arranged by the Women's Civic Improvement League, was pretty, neat and attractive, and the ladies who planned and took part in the parade are to be commended. They carried off the sweepstakes and they were certainly entitled to it.

If the Holstein and Jersey breeders of Tillamook County can get together and forget their contention as to which breed is best for dairying purposes, surely there should be no trouble in the nations at war in Europe also getting together.

The snap shot man is strongly of the opinion that it is not necessary to send "outside" for attractions when anything takes place in this county. The fair last week again fully demonstrated that Tillamookers have the ability to make plenty of attractions and amusement when they get started in that direction.

It looks as if a strike on the railroads is inevitable and we are inclined to think that it is just as well to fight it out now as some other time, for the brotherhood of railroad men are determined to force the eight hour issue. It is going to paralyze business for a time and if the unions win the fight it will extend to other industries all over the country.

Remember that with all the road and building improvements going on in this vicinity, the one thing of greatest importance to the central part of the county is the improvement of the slough from the bay to Tillamook City. We want to impress this fact on everybody in this city and vicinity. Why not make a strong, united effort, in a co-operative spirit, and bring this about, for it means a great future to this part of the county?

The get together banquet between the farmers and the business men at the close of the county fair appears to have caused some favorable comment by the press of the state. This is what the Oregonian said:

"The banquet of farmers and business men at the close of the Tillamook Fair had the nature of an annual dinner that was a great feature of the 'entire shows' of the East. The plan can be repeated at every county fair in Oregon with profit in all ways."

It is safe to say that farmers and business men in other counties will get together after the annual fairs, and as Tillamook has the reputation of being a county that brought about great results by a co-operative, get together spirit in dairying, which other agricultural sections are endeavoring to do, Tillamook is taking the lead in bringing about a more co-operative spirit between farmers and business men. It was the Holstein Breeders' Association that started the movement, and we predict that good results will be accomplished by getting together in a truly co-operative spirit.

As the county fair is now an annual affair it appears to us that it is about time that the county owned its own fair grounds. The next budget should contain an appropriation for that purpose, provided that 20 or 30 acres of land can be obtained at a reasonable figure not far from the city. There is some talk of the Southern Pacific Co. selling the present fair grounds, and in that event all the improvements made there will have to be torn down. Should the fair county buy a piece of land for a fair ground, it would be a good thing to fix it up as a public park, and in that event it would answer two purposes.

In behalf of the Tillamook Commercial Club and the business men, we want to express thanks to the Fair Board, the superintendents and those who exhibited stock, farm products and other exhibits, and those who took an active part in the fair. We thoroughly appreciate their efforts and feel glad to commend them for the time and pains they took to make the fair a big success in every way. And in this connection we must not overlook the creditable school exhibits. Let us all work for a bigger and better fair next year and all pull together again as we did this year, for united effort is what is essential to bring about better results.

Maybe the horse races at the fair were not classical from a horse racer's point of view, but they amused and held the crowd. Governor Withycombe was probably right when he said it needs horse racing at county fairs to make them interesting. Far better put a little more money into horse racing and less into "outside" attractions in the future, is the verdict of the snap shot man who saw how those attended the fair last week and had a whole lot of fun watching what would be called a lot of "scrub" horse races. When the snap shot man suggested the county owning its own fair ground, "Buy a piece of land big enough for a race track," came from

those who favored the idea.

It is a capital idea to have a Tillamook County Agricultural Council, to act as a local advisory board to assist the county agriculturalist. But organizations are getting too numerous in this county, and instead of increasing them we believe they should be decreased and consolidated. All of the present organizations have about the same object in view and all are interested in the agricultural development and prosperity of the people. We all agree on this essential point, and it seems to us that instead of having so many different and small organizations, one big, strong organization could and would do more good. We believe our doctrine of getting together and pulling together also applies to the different organizations now in existence in this county. All are endeavoring to do good work, but under one strong, active organization they would accomplish a great deal more.

It was the Holstein Breeders' Association that first suggested holding a get together banquet for the purpose of giving the glad hand to the Jersey Breeders' Association and the business men of this city. It was a capital idea. It simply showed this, that we are more or less intimately connected and need one another's help and assistance, no matter whether we live on the farm or in the city. We believe the banquet did a whole lot of good and created quite a community interest in business affairs and co-operation. The business men, the dairy-men, the school districts and the Women's Civic Improvement League all got behind the fair and gave it a great boost. This was united effort and the people of the county would accomplish a great deal more in community building and improvements if they would pull together and work together as they did to make the fair a success.

There is no denying the fact that in a few years the automobile travel into Tillamook will bring into the county more money than the dairy industry. The loop the loop will be one of the most attractive drives in Oregon. It may be a little premature to advocate, as was done at the banquet on Friday, that each county hard surface its part of the loop, for the reason that that is a most expensive undertaking. It would require at least \$750,000 and more, probably \$1,000,000 to hard surface the highway through Tillamook, which this county is not prepared to expend at this time for that purpose. As we have often advocated, \$100,000 of the road fund should be expended every year for hard surfacing as soon as present road projects are completed. If other counties would build several miles of hard surfaced road every year, in a few years a large proportion of the loop would be hard surfaced.

The snap shot man was greatly disappointed at the small display of dahlias at the county fair. Our remarks are not to criticize, for we have only words of praise for those who work so hard to make the fair a success, but to create a greater interest in making a bigger and better display next year. The limited space allotted for floral displays was altogether too small and wrongly located, and when those who wanted to enter or display dahlias, saw these conditions they had nothing to do but to take their dahlias away. Now is the time to lay plans for another year and do better. A suitable building should be erected for flowers, and we are going to suggest that the Women's Civic Improvement League take this matter up. It may be that the League could erect a suitable building of a portable character, to be used at the fair grounds during the fair. And we do not know but what it would be a splendid attraction during the dahlia season to have a display, say once a week. Most everybody who grows dahlias would be glad to donate flowers for this purpose. True it is that this was not a good year for dahlias, but if we ever expect to make this the dahlia city a little more interesting must be taken in making attractive displays. Let the dahlia display be a big feature at next year's county fair with plenty of room provided and a good many prizes offered. Everybody boost for a bigger and better dahlia exhibit.

Experience has proven that the old system of a road supervisor for each voting or road district is responsible for bad roads and a wilful waste of road funds, but notwithstanding this we see that the Yamhill County Pomona Grange has gone on record advocating a board of directors for each district, similar to school districts, to construct roads. We are opposed to any such system as that, because the best result cannot be obtained by multiplying boards to construct roads. There is one system that every county should adopt and that is to put the road department under one head, and we believe better results would be obtained if our school system was operated that way, doing away with the different school districts. That is the trend of public sentiment in road work and school management. Some counties have 50 to 60 road districts, and it is easy to guess with that number of road district boards in a county there would be about that many different kinds of roads. The old road supervisor system has been old road supervisor system had been eating up considerable road money and to create district road boards and to create a repetition of that would mean a repetition of that wasteful system. We expect to see, before many years, the road work of every county in Oregon under one management, and the counties that do this will get the best results. One can see the difference in traveling over this county, or other parts of Oregon, between roads that have been constructed under the latest system of road building and those which are not. Road building is a business and should be conducted the same as other business enterprises, but the trouble is so many inexperienced persons are employed to lay out and build roads. We are strongly in favor of placing the road work of each county

under one management, thus eliminating so many "bosses," but the resolution adopted by the Yamhill Pomona Grange greatly increases the "bosses" in road work, and should a law pass to that effect it would cause friction and trouble. We give below the resolution, which is self explanatory:

"Resolved, that we the Pomona Grange of Yamhill County, petition the State Grange to prepare a bill and present the same to the Legislature changing the road laws so that each road district elect a board of directors which board shall have supervision of the road work the same as the district school board of directors direct the work of the school; the board to be elected at an annual road meeting of the district for three years, electing one each year, and they shall serve without pay and shall appoint a competent road supervisor who shall be responsible to the board and here a road master is employed and to the County Court where no road master is employed."
