**OH! WHAT A SURPRISE!**  
**WOULDN'T THAT JAR YOU!**  
**One of the Aspirants For Prosecuting Attorney Has a Prison Record**  
 It was a great big surprise that the people of Tillamook participated in the past few days, when it became known that one of the aspirants for prosecuting attorney for Tillamook county had a prison record against him.  
 It is Attorney Wm. Marx, who was a candidate for prosecuting attorney at the primary election, on the Republican ticket. Attorney T. H. Goynne being the other candidate. 772 votes were cast for Goynne and 746 for Marx. This gave Goynne the Republican nomination by a small majority.  
 Not being satisfied with the vote, Marx circulated a petition as an "independent" candidate and filed this with the Secretary of State last week.  
 Attorney J. R. Callahan also blossomed into an "independent" candidate for the office of district attorney and in the first round it was Callahan who turned the lime light on one of his opponents and ran over him with the steam roller, which completely knocked Marx out of the race, which made people look up and take notice. It came about in this way. Callahan in a letter notified Marx what he had on him, when the latter acknowledged it by saying that he would not be a candidate, but he had already filed his petition. For several weeks rumors have been floating around that Marx had been a jail bird and had a prison record. Callahan followed this up with the result that he received a description of Marx from the Wisconsin State Prison and three identification pictures. The back of the picture was Marx's prison pedigree in that state. It is also rumored that this is not the only case in which Marx figured in, which will be forthcoming in a few days.  
 This goes to show that anybody with a bad record don't want to run for public office, for it is sure to be ferreted out and loom up as a big mountain at an inopportune time.  
 Had Marx wanted to act honorable and on the square when he came to Tillamook, his past record would not have been investigated and made public, but he has made himself ridiculous on several occasions and accused some of our best citizens of that which was false. An illustration of this appeared in the justice court last week, when in a sworn affidavit by F. D. Small, Marx being his attorney, two of our local attorneys and the justice of the peace were accused of things that were untrue and reflected on their high standing in the community.  
 A man with a prison record should be the last person to hurl base insinuations at other persons, and this is one reason why so many persons became disgusted with Marx and the blustering methods he used in law cases.
