Besides the above number there were about 80 cows producing 40 lbs. of butterfat for the month. Amos Vaughn's herd of 22 cows have an average of 45.17 lbs. of butterfat for August. Some few in the association are feeding a small amount of grain throughout the summer, but pasture with green feed is depended upon entirely by the majority and although pastures are good for this time of year, the above is a very creditable showing.
