Mr. Effenberger thinks that for many years the road district in the north part of the county was discriminated against, but it seems to be a well settled fact in the mind of the snap shot man that for the past ten or twelve years, a whole lot of splendid road improvements have been made in the north part of the county and it took a whole lot of money, and the large amount that is being expended in that district this year should put the roads there in splendid condition.

The County Court went over the proposed Bayocean road via Netarts on Wednesday. To connect the road at Netarts with Bayocean will require seven miles of new road to be built, five miles of which would be heavy construction over a mountain 500 feet high, with some heavy grades and through timber, which would make the road costly and hard to maintain, especially in winter. The County Court has expended \$16,000 on the bay side road, which will be a water level road and one third of the disance to Bayocean, which should not e lost sight of, for there is no necessity of making people travel that distance after they arrive on the train in this city. Anyone can see from a tax-payers' point of view that the County Court should complete the present road project to Bayocean, but if Wm. Maxwell and other property owners want a road to their property, so as to place it on the market to better advantage, and the time is ripe for it, we are not going to raise any objec-tions, but they should not place anything in the way of having the present bay route completed.

a while we have Every once in discuss the bonding question with some of our citizens who favor bonding the county for hard surfaced roads. There may be some good points in the arguments advanced in its favor, yet for all that it seems to us that, owing to the unsettled state of affairs this is no time to plunge the county into a bonded indebtedness. If we express the sentiment of the taxpayers of the county, although most of them want a fair amount of public improvements, they do not want to be taxed to death, and a little less taxation would be greatly appreciated we feel sure, by all taxpayers. It is true very little curtailment can be made in expenditures outside of road work, owing to the law being fixed in such a manner that certain expenses have to be provided for every year, while on the other hand we know there is a strong sentiment in favor of good roads in this county. Some persons want to bond and then cut down the road levy one half. That sounds good, but we will gamble that in a few years the road levy would be up to its limit and added to this would be the expense of the bonded indebtedness and interest. Most taxpayers want less taxation, but where is the proper place to make a curtail-



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
