THEY PLAN TO ENLARGE THE PORT OF TILLAMOOK

Whole Bay Section, 125 Miles Square to be Included if Scheme Passes.

Petitions are to be placed in circulation this week praying for the enlargement of the boundry scope of the Port of Tillamook, which at present comprises only the area occupied by the town. If the proposal is ratified at a special election to be held the latter part of November the confines of the port will em-brace a territory 125 miles square, making all the property therein tax-

able for harbor improvements.
R. B. Compton, attorney for the Port of Tillamook, says the petitions are being drawn up and will be ready for signatures in a few days. If 8 per cent of the voters in Tillamook and the adjoining territory sought to be added, affix their names to the petitions the county court will name a day for submission of the proposition

to the electors.

According to Mr. Compton the assessed valuation of the property in the Port district will be increased from \$1,200,000 to about \$5,000,000 if the proposal meets with the approval of the voters. Under the law the Port of Tillamook has no authority to impose a tax levy for more than 2 per cent for harbor im-provements. Many of the business men there, it is declared, hold that a more adequate sum is needed for improving the harbor facilities than can be procured on the assessable propererty in the present district.

The port authorities are anxious to deepen and widen the channel between Tillamook and Bay City. If they can get to a depth of 10 feet at the zero stage it is stated they would be satisfied for a while. A-top of this there usually is a flood tide of about seven feet, affording sufficient amount of water for the accommodation of the majority of the steam schooners playing up and down the coast. The channel over the Tilla-mook bar has a depth of 12 feet at

the low water stage.
