We, the undersigned, members of the Grand Jury, respectfully report that we have inquired into all crimes committed in the county which have been called to our attention, or of which we have had any knowledge; that we have also inquired into the condition and management of the offices pertaining to the courts of public justice, and the condition and management of the public prisons of the county.

We desire to commend and congratulate the citizens of Tillamook City for the fine city hall which they have built which we are sure reflects credit upon the city. We would commend, however, that some better means of ventilating the prison therein be provided than that now provided, so that the health of all prisoners that may be kept therein may be preserved.

We also examined into the conditions of the county courthouse, including its jail and various county offices therein, and we find that the records of such officers are well and systematically kept, that the county court has provided a good practical system of expediting and auditing the

financial records of the county clerk, sheriff and county treasurer, and such finances, judging by the reports of such experts appear to be in good condition.

We find that the vault room of the various county officers is insufficient, and this is especially so with the offices of the county clerk and sheriff. The jury rooms are inadequate for the needs of the circuit court, and the south door of the basement needs repairing so as to keep the water from driving into the basement when storms occur.

We would recommend that the county court, as soon as it is practicable, take such steps as it may deem wise and prudent to make the necessary changes in the courthouse to remedy these matters, and especially to arrange at an early date to provide increased vault room for such clerk and sheriff; but that in so doing they have regard to the prospective increase of business and such future changes as it may be advisable to make in such courthouse, so that any changes to be made now, involving much expense, may be utilized and of practical benefit in any plans which may be made for the future enlargement thereof.
