Mr. Julean Arnold, American commercial attache, accredited to Japan, has returned to this country to tell us about trade conditions in the Orient. We shall be glad to learn why it is that Japan has increased her exports to the United States from \$92,000,000 in 1913, under our protective tariff, to \$148,000,000 in 1916, under Democratic free trade, while our exports to her have increased from \$58,-000,000 in 1913 to only \$75,000,-000 in 1916. ### MODERATE DRINKING.

Noted New York . Physician . Gives

one of New York city's best known physicians and publicits. His writings on health matters in the New York
Herald have attracted the wide tention. In the following excerpt from The Herald of January 2, 1916, Dr. Roller treats the subject of moderation in a sane and rational man-

"There has been a popular fallacy saliva we could not eat without drinking and we could not taste anything. The saliva is about 98 per cent water, and those who waste that saliva by chewing gum and tobacco have sooner or later dyspepsia or evidence of poor nutrition. Water is necessary with food, and, strange to say, the quantity and dulition of the stomach contents have nothing whatever to do plied the shrewd specialist. with the strength of he digestive secretions. I mean that whether there be an ounce or a quart of food in the sir. stomach the degree of alkalinity necessary for starch digestion in the first twenty minutes will be the same, and the hydrochloric acid will be secreted until the contents of the stomach contain that acid in the proportion of twe-tenths per cent. Foods that are less concentrated can often be digested more easily than those which are taken without water. I think the foods are far more easily digested and absorbed if they are diluted by a reas-onable amount of liquid, especially water, ale, beer, wine or coffee. Drink hot water a half hour before meals to wash out the elementary canal and to supply water for glandular secretion. Drink plenty of water, preferably hot or warm (never ice water), with meals, but never drink anything after the meal is once finished for at least two hours. If you do you dilute the digestive juices and stop the process at that point. The food is then thrown into the intestines unprepared, and is likely to ferment or be absorbed undigested, in which case it acts like a

"Alcohol beverages for those who are run down and want to put on weight serve a useful purpose. They make food more agreeable, render the disposition more cheerful, serve as a "Well. her substitute for food, which may be stored up, and aid in the absorption of most foods, especially fats and oils. The pernicious habit many people have of taking alcohol drinks at meals or before to stimulate the appetite is wrong. If you have no appetite don't eat. All alcoholics should be taken in moderation, of course, and, as in the case of food, take them only when you need them or when you work hard enough to use them up.

"Many have inquired of me about the use of tea and coffee. They each contain an alkaloid one thein and the other caffein, the physiologic effect of which is to greatly stimulate, especially the nervous and vascular systems. Quite naturally, then, they should not be taken within several hours of bedtime, because they tend to keep one awake. To be thoroughly awakened in the morning, however, is a good thing, and so for breakfast, and even for lunch, in the case of those doing mental work, they serve a useful purpose and are not in the least harmful when taken in reasonable quantities. Coffee is less likely to be harmful than tea, because tea contains tannic acid, which tends to interfere with digestion. In making tea, however, that objection can be largely overcome if the beverage is prepared with green tea and boiling water and not allowed to soak more than a few minutes. The longer the tea is exposed to hot water the more tannic acid will be dissolved out, while the solution from the first five minutes contains very little. I strongly recommend a cup of coffee or two for adults in the morning, though with children the sleep is more important and stimulation is usually unnecessary.
