And has appropriated the cost of said improvements to the respective lots and tracts of ground which are situated within Local Improvement District No. 5, of Tillamook City, Oregon, being all of the property fronting and abutting upon or adjacent to said proposed improvements and especially benefited thereby, and at the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, has appointed Saturday the 11th day of November, 1916, at the City Hall in Tillamook City, Oregon, at the hour of 8 p.m. as the time and place at which the Common Council shall hear and determine all objections to the apportionment of the cost of said street improvement, and that at said meeting or at such other time as the hearing may be adjourned to, the Common Council will hear and determine such objections and make such changes therein as shall be necessary to make such apportionment equitable and just.
