Bro. Trombley says "Wall Street defeated by the common people." Pray tell us, Bro. Trombley, who are the people who voted for Hughes? We resent such nasty insinuations and reflections being cast upon Republicans and those who voted for the Republican ticket.

Bro. Trombley is seeking a hole to hide himself in. He surely was some knocker when he boosted for a party that placed every Tillamook product on the Democratic free trade list, with all the business men, with but few exceptions, in favor of the Republican nominee.

Wrong again, Bro. Trombley, most everybody at the city hall Tuesday night had a pleasant smile and Republicans had no cause to wear long faces. The only person who wore a frown on his face was Bro. The fatal accident that befell Editor Wellington, on Wednesday was, no doubt, the cause of carelessness in not taking proper precaution in

driving over railroad crossings, and to speeding, for there is no doubt whatever that he drove too fast in his auto. It is a matter of regret that a young life should be so suddenly wiped out, but it should be a warning to others not to dash across a railroad track with the expectation of beating a train. It is no doubt a fact that the county road at that point does not give people an opportunity of seeing an approaching train, but this is no excuse, for proper precautions should be taken before a railroad track is crossed. As long as people who drive autos place speed before safety first there are going to be numerous accidents and the sad accident that befell Editor Wellington must be included in this class. We are informed that two accidents were averted there by coming in collision with trains recently but they managed to escape. The County Court should see if something can be done with the road.

Henry Tohl has passed away, who was one of those who strove hard and worked strenuously for the development of the north part of the county, especially the city of Nehalem. He was one of those who fought for the improvement of Nehalem bar, which is of vast importance to the north part of the county. True it is that for many long years factional fights in that part of the county divided the people, in which the Tohl faction played an important part, but notwithstanding this Henry Tohl was always ready to lend his support to public improvements and was devotedly interested in the north part of the county. Like most of us he had his faults, but his name will long be remembered in that part of the county. He has passed away on the eve of great developments in the north part of the county which he and others predicted would come about in the near future, and he was one of the pioneers who strove long and worked hard when there were but few settlers there, his name should always be included amongst those who did his share in helping develop Tillamook County. The snap shot man has known Mr. Tohl for 18 years, and we must play a tribute to his memory as one of the pioneers who help to make it what it is today. One thing we always admired about Mr. Tohl was the glad hand he always gave the Press and the snap shot man when visiting Nehalem, and the hospitality he always displayed.

Now that the election is over, we would suggest that our citizens turn their attention and energies to civic improvements. Not a few of our enterprising, energetic citizens, but everybody get in and help. There is much to be done before Tillamook City can compare with other progressive business centers, and although we have made a beginning there is a great deal more to be done in civic improvements. We want our citizens to take pride in the civic improvement of this city, not in a spasmodic manner but keep at it all the time. This can be accomplished by the ladies joining the Women's Civic Improvement League and the men the Commercial Club, both organizations should have a membership of at least 250, and with 500 citizens all pulling together at the commencement of the new year, much progress would be made and splendid results would be accomplished. Civic improvements will help the business life and business activities of the city, and as loyal citizens let us all turn our attention and devote our energies in beautifying and improving the city. This is a far more important matter than most of our citizens realize, for it is generally conceded by a number of our leading business men that some of the timber representatives are showing a decided antagonism to this city and opposing improvements that are of vital importance, not only to this city but to the central part of the county. We are sorry to have to admit this, but it is a condition that will have to be met and fought out, and the way to do so is by united effort on the part of our citizens. Get the civic improvement spirit. Join the Women's Civic Improvement League and Commercial Club. Both organizations need your support and co-operation, and you are offered the glad hand to help along the civic improvement campaign for 1917.
