The County Court is in session this week computing the county budget.

The Shakespeare Club met last Friday for its monthly meeting, with the hostess on this occasion being Mrs. B. C. Lamb. The club had another pleasant afternoon, the hostess serving a dainty lunch. There were several invited guests.

Thomas H. Kempster who was indicted about 12 months ago on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences, was arrested in Portland last week and Deputy Sheriff Campbell brought him in on Sunday. As he admits his guilt, it is thought that he will plead guilty when Judge Bagley convenes court next Monday.

Judge Bagley will hold circuit court on Monday next, and the following cases have been set for trial: Monday, Worthington vs. Worthington, Tuesday, Dawson vs. Shrode; Wednesday, Stiverson vs. Stiverson, Johnson vs. Johnson, Hastings vs. Hastings; Cone vs. Provost (?); Thursday, Nolan vs. Talmage; providing the parties are willing to try the case without a jury.

A compromise was arrived at in the case of the Tillamook Bay Construction Co. vs. Yamhill and Tillamook Counties, which was tried at Hillsboro. It was agreed that the two counties pay the contractor \$4,000, each side to pay its expenses. The construction company sued for \$8000. The Tillamook County Court was in favor of deciding the case by arbitration, but the Yamhill County Court would not agree to that.

An effort is being made to secure state aid for what is known as the Indian reservation in Yamhill county, which have been in bad condition for auto travel. As the new State Road recently built by Yamhill and Tillamook counties will be thrown open to travel early next year, which eliminates the Dalph hill and toll gate, and as there will be a large travel next year over the loop through Yamhill, Tillamook, Clatsop and Columbia counties, the road through the reservation should be put in better condition for travel. At a meeting of the Tillamook Commercial Club Monday night a resolution was adopted asking the County Court to lend its assistance in obtaining state aid for that purpose, and a committee from the club was appointed to cooperate with the County Courts of Yamhill and Tillamook counties composed of D. L. Shrode, C. J. Edwards, H. Crenshaw, H. H. Rosenberg and the president Fred C. Baker. The Portland Automobile Club is also interested in this improvement and will also lend its assistance in procuring state funds. It is expected that all these organizations will appear before the State Commission in the near future.

RESIGNS CITIZENSHIP BECAUSE WILSON WON.

Father Clarence Won't Become an American Under President.

Helena Mont, Nov. 13—The Rev. Francis Von Clarence, formerly of Helena, but now of Tillamook, Ore., has sent his naturalization papers and a letter resigning his citizenship to the district clerk here. The letter in part said that "to see a man returned to power after an administration and policy such as we have seen during the past four years is too much for me." The full text of the letter was not given out.

LITTLE NESTUCCA DAIRYMEN FIGHTING MAD.

Large Delegation Come to City and Hold Meeting in Court House.

The dairymen and other residents of the Little Nestucca valley are fighting mad, and a large delegation came to the city on Wednesday and held what may be called an indignation meeting. The delegation consisted of a large number of the best citizens of the Little Nestucca valley, men who helped to make that part of the county what it is today, with its beautiful farms, homes, barns, and numerous cheese factories, which produce one third of the cheese made in Tillamook County.

What got the Little Nestuccaites "goat" was a circular petition accompanying which was a map, ignoring Little Nestucca on the highway through the county. It was Tuesday when one of these circular petitions reached one of the citizens, and next morning a large delegation reached the city.

A meeting was called at the court house and Frank Taylor was chosen chairman.

The first matter taken up was the improvement of the Little Nestucca road, which the state engineer had approved as a state highway. It was decided to ask the County Court to place \$15,000 in the budget for permanent work on that road, some however, advocated \$20,000.

The meeting went on record as opposed to the plan of the circular letter, which it was contended would deprive the Little Nestucca Valley of the contemplated improvement and would delay it indefinitely.

It was stated at the meeting that state aid was promised last year and A. G. Beals was appointed to wait on the road commission and see what amount of money could be obtained. Frank Taylor and L. M. Kramer were appointed as spokesmen for the delegation at the meeting with the county court in the court house in the afternoon. Mr. Taylor spoke of the need of the road and that the state engineer had designated the Little Nestucca valley as the State Highway and that the delegation requested that \$15,000 be placed in the budget. Mr. Kramer went more fully into the merits of the Little Nestucca road, and stated that the taxable value of the property in that vicinity was \$1,250,000, while that of the Three Rivers amounted to only \$30,000. He was not opposed to the improvement of the Three Rivers road, neither was the delegation, but the dairy industry of that part of the county was centered in the Little Nestucca Valley and they were justly entitled to have \$15,000 placed in the budget, for that part of the county needed to be developed.

Mr. Kramer displayed the circular petition and the map accompanying it. He pointed out that no one in the Little Nestucca valley had signed it, and it was also pointed out that only one business man of Tillamook City had done so. Mr. Kramer contended that if \$100,000 was taken from the road fund and used for hard surfacing there would be only enough money left for repairs and nothing for the Little Nestucca road, the Bayocean road and other roads that should be completed.

A. G. Beals also made a plea for an appropriation of \$15,000, and called the court's attention to the fact that there were men in the delegation who had resided in the Little Nestucca for 25 years or more, who were the backbone of the county.

Afternoon Military Five-Hundred Party.

Refreshments were served at the conclusion of the game, the table decorations being carried out in Red White and Blue with Chrysanthemums in the center, the guests' favors consisting of Tricolor Cocades.

The Dead Town.

Did you ever go into a town and, as you stepped from the train, have it strike you suddenly that the town was dead? Have you ever had a town described to you as a dead town? Have you ever stopped to analyze just what is meant by these words "dead town"? In the last analysis they mean just one thing—and that is that the merchants of the town don't advertise. A dead town has certain positive aspects of demise which are as bald as a piece of crepe hanging on the door of a private house. The stores seem to be merely existing. Their shelves are covered with apparently unsaleable goods. The storekeepers seem to be vying each other to see which will win the first prize as the town grouch. If you talked with them they knocked the town, knocked business, they knocked the mail order house. They were continually complaining that other people did business and made money but they didn't seem to be able to sell anything. They guessed it was the town. Yes, that was it—the town. If you asked the merchant if he advertised, he would have looked at you with amazement. What was the use of advertising when business was so bad? People who had money to spend he would tell you, were sending it to the mail order houses. No, he would say he didn't advertise. He wouldn't throw good money after bad. On the other hand, go into a live town and what will you see? The merchants have attractive displays in their stores. The daily or weekly newspapers are filled with announcements of special sales of low priced goods. They are not afraid of the mail order houses because they have the same means to reach the people—advertising—that makes the mail order houses great. The merchants have their local association for mutual help, and behind the association the newspaper is pushing, pushing, pushing. Everybody is working, and everybody is happy and boosting. If you want a live town get behind the newspaper and the newspaper will do the rest. Forget the time worn arguments that the paper is a dead one. The paper is live enough if the people are alive. The surest test of a live town is a live newspaper, and a newspaper can't be alive unless the town boosters do their share.—Current.
